## BIDDING FORUM

The panel for this month's problems consists of Ron Borg, Jim Donaldson, Ede Bonnell, Eric Stark, Buddy Crapko, Jack Marsch, Dolly Shapiro, and me as Moderator. I hope to enlarge next month's panel, but these were all who bothered to reply.

east- west vul - matchpoint scoring

When this problem appeared in last month's issue it was missing a small heart. Typographical errors such as this always bring out the comedian in panelists and this was no exception.

BORG: TWEE SPEARTS - just a temporizing callu until they deal me my thirteenth card.
CRAPKO: Hands with twelve cards are difficult to bid correctly. Assuming the missing card is a small heart I bid three clubs and hope to make a better decision at my next opportunity.

It would appear to me that the all purpose cue bid is the most flexible. This view was also echoed by Donaldson and MARSCH: 3 C - There is no really suitable bid on this hand. 3 D followed spade support may give partner a disastrous misconception as to my club length. I dislike 3 or 4 spades on only three card support.

Not so worried about three card support and displaying the straight
forward style which has won her many victories: BONNELL: 3 Spades -18 points in support of spades.

Another straightforward view:
SHAPIRO: 3 Hearts - Knowing about my six card suit should be helpful. 3 Clubs or 3 Spades may not land us in the optimum contract.

Rounding out the panel - the maniac fringe.
STARK: Double - Seems to be the most profitable call. 18 will proceed to game if partner yanks.

Eric obviously intends to defend the hand better than he has bid it.
B. S- J H- 1042 D- A K 1073 C- A K 92 east west vul, RHO, first seat opens 1 Heart What do you call?

My apologies. This problem bombed. I was angling for a double but the panel treated me with disdain.

BONNELL - 2 Diamonds- Double out of the question.
MARSCH - 2 Diamonds- Can't identify the alternatives
SHAPIRO - 2 Diamonds- Dislike passing
STARK - Pass - immediate action seems premature.

Our comedian:
BORG: 2 Diamonds- a pox on the doublers, passers, and the unusual no trumpers.

The only panelists to even consider a double were:
CRAPKO: Double or 2 Diamonds depending on style. A pass may work out well but I like to get in the auctions.

The other possible doubler was Donaldson. Jim is certainly Vancouver's premier theorititian and his detailed analysis of this problem is certainly thought provoking.
DONALDSON: Pass - Tomorrow I may double.

Most of the panelists discussed and then discarded the unusual no trump. Crapko called it absurd. I will not insult the reader's intelligence by even considering the unusual no trump any further.

The general feeling of the panel was to run from the double. The passers were Crapko, Donaldson and
MARSCH: Pass- Partner's hand rates to be along the lines of S-A J 10 H- A K x x x x and a minor suit A or K. I would guess that we would be plus 200 about $\frac{3}{4}$ of the time on this or similar holdings and that should be sufficiently rewarding to justify the possibility of minus 730 ( or 930 Ed.).

However the level and denomination of the runout was anything but uni form.

BORG: 4 Clubs - My partner would overcall in hearts with a one suited hand; yes even with that many points.

Bonnell: 4 Diamonds - not one feather of defense.
SHAPIRO: 4 Hearts -4 clubs a close second choice. The possibility of partner reaching my hand on defense seems remote and a pass could be disastrous.

STARK: 5 Clubs - just a gamble.
I agree that the double should be removed but I think the panel has missed a rather descriptive call. 3 NT can't be misconstrued and must show a doubleton heart and spade void.

This problem separated into two camps. The bashers and the finessers.
First, the bashers.
BORG: 6 Hearts- I shun science on auctions like this. My energetic opponents must be Hagen and Graves.

BONNELL: Partner must be strong and distributional. If you go down, give him hell for overbidding.

STARK: 6 Hearts - should peel with partner having $6-5$ or $7-5$ distribution and surely a spade void.

An in betweener:
SHAPIRO: 4 NT - my values have become more than adequate. I hope Dolly has discussed Blackwood when the opponents intervene.

The finessers.
Donaldson, Crapko and Marsch all cue bid five clubs. I agree with this for partner will surely not misconstrue the call and, as Marsch points out, will lead partner to the right defense against a spade sacrifice.

Well, that's our first forum. New problems are following and as promised an enlarged panel next month.

Poor Old Michael or how to be the only one to go down in 3 NT with nine tricks.

Mike Strebinger has long insisted he is the unluckiest bridge player in Vancouver. I was always a little skeptical but this following example has finally convinced me. Mike, partnered by Jim Donaldson, played 3 NT in the recent sectional open pairs. His right hand opponent had overcalled in spades at the one level.

Opening lead, spade 10
Mike took the opening spade lead with his king. He ploced all the outstanding strength, not unnaturally, with his RHO and in order to retain communication he led a low heart to the ten, planning a finnesse of the Queen on the next round. LHO took the heart jack and returned a spade. Mike won the ace and finessed a heart. Had this won and the suit broke $3-3$ he would have made six for a well deserved top, or close to it. Alas the finesse lost and being out of spades LHO returned a diamond. Mike hopped up and played Ace a:d Queen of clubs overtaking with the king. When the suit broke $5-1$ Mike could still rely on a $3-3$ heart division. Of course that didn't happen and he went down with nine top tricks. This is surely the correct line at matchpoints but alas no one else found this line and Mike got a zero......poor old Michael.

That is all for this month. Solve the bidding problems, get your balanced team of four for the 14 th and start thinking of your February Swiss team.
