NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT JULIE GOODWW-HOUSET

ON THE SUBJECT OF SCHEDULING: October 15 was a dark day for club and unit bridge organizers (see letter to the editor, page 4). The Unit Executive has been striving to organize events with enough advance warning that other clubs and organizations can avoid overlaps. It is also very important for the players in order that they may plan their schedules, both bridge and personal. On pages 18 and 19, you will find a new format for the Upcoming Events. It includes EVERY day of the months between one Matchpointer Deadline and another. Events are indicated, weekends are indicated, and if there is no event scheduled, a line has been drawn. If you are scheduling events, LOOK FOR AVAILABLE DAYS first. and chose your date accordingly. Pay attention to sectionals in the area, both in-unit and outside the unit. As editor of the Bridge Buff, I receive all sectional and regional dates in District 19. I have included them in our own upcoming events. HOWEVER, this listing can only go so far into the future. At the bottom you will also find what we know of later months, which will help you somewhat but will not solve conflicts between local clubs and playing areas. Your best bet is to CONFIRM ANY DATES WITH THE MATCHPOINTER, prior to publishing your flyers. If you are planning a major club-sponsored event, make every effort to pick your date 4-6 months ahead and confirm with the Matchpointer as soon as possible. The Unit Executive always has a 12-month calendar, as current as possible, which can be obtained if requested. ON THE SUBJECT OF VOLUNTEERS: Too much is being done by too few. It is neither reasonable nor successful to expect 12 people to run all the events in our unit,

supply hospitality, promotion, organize, schedule, co-ordinate, keep records and statistics, handle sites, awards, supplies, trophies, etc., etc. There are each year, six multi-level events which require co-ordination at the club level. six Vancouver Championship events, three major Unit-sponsored games, eleven unit games, one Future Stars Sectional, five large sectionals, and IMP League with three flights, at least twenty-two clubs and 1,300 members. About 50% of these are either new or have less than 100 masterpoints and deserve personal encouragement and attention. The solution to all this work is COMMITTEE. Each of the 12 unit executive members needs a committee of happy volunteers. The more volunteers we have, the less work there is to do! In the past, Vancouver players were very generous in the volunteer department. At present, we receive many more complaints than we do offerings of service. The massive bulk of work put on the shoulders of the executive further discourages members to volunteer for the Unit Executive itself. Organizing bridge events can be a lot of fun.... Let me give you examples of the small jobs which need doing: Volunteer caddies for Vancouver Championship Events (to save money for subsidy) approximately 3 hours of your time; volunteer cookie and cake bakers; volunteer reporters for the Matchpointer (club news, upcoming events, etc) volunteer stand-ins for unit games, volunteer 'official statistician', volunteers to help promote membership growth, volunteers to help man a membership booth at all tournaments, volunteer telephone people... all enjoyable and helpful services. The Sectional Committee needs volunteers to help with posters, and hospitality. The Special Events committees need volunteers. The Matchpointer needs volunteers. We all need volunteers. This fall, YOU might be asked to volunteer. Please be generous. Even the smallest amount of time and service will be welcome. Call me at 224-2210, and let me know how much time you are able to give.

COMPLAINTSEPARTMENT

Why were the various CLUB EPSON game results not listed in the Matchpointer?

The clubs did not submit their results to the Matchpointer. Although this was an International Event, clubs were responsible for running the event (or not) and were not required to inform the unit as to whether or not an Epson game was held at their venue. On this basis, it would have been a difficult and timeconsuming task to discover which clubs ran the event, and what their results were. In fact, this editor did not even consider it. Perhaps I have been remiss. In the past, there has been a club-news volunteer whose job was to call all the clubs prior to MP deadline, in order to ensure that their news was current. This was convenient and pleasant, both for the club owners and their patrons. Perhaps we should have someone continue this service. I herein welcome any volunteer. Please call the Matchpointer office if interested.

Who is the *\$#** who scheduled the NAOPC Unit Finals on the Labour Day weekend?! And managed to slip it by many qualifiers...

The Unit Board would like to apologize, sincerely, for this error. While embroiled in the struggle with dates and schedules, (the fall calendar, as you know, if very full of both sectionals and special events) we failed to give proper importance to the long weekend in September. Also, although the dates were posted at a larger club as well as listed in the August Match Pointer, the two or three weeks notice was, admittedly, not sufficient. In future, Unit finals will be announced DURING THE QUALIFYING STAGE, so all will be informed before they plan their schedules.

Why isn't the UNIT taking responsibility for the INTER-CITY IMP PAIRS event?

In the past, it was agreed by the unit board, that the Inter-City IMP Pairs would not be a Unit Game, nor sanctioned, as there was some 'gambling' involved. As a result, the Unit Board did not pay much attention to the event's organization until, perhaps, it was too late.

As a result, rumours were flying, the Haida Club was put under needless pressure, and attendance was abysmal.

The Inter-City IMP Pairs is a great event, and should be one of Vancouver's premier games.

In future, the Unit will take responsibility for the promotion and organization of this event.

The Calcutta will remain an integral part of the event, so there will be no sanction. However

the quality and excitement of the

game should encourage participation.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

As one who has, in the various positions I have held over the years, had a lot to do with scheduling, I have every sympathy with organizers of bridge events trying to avoid overlaps. Nevertheless, I find the situation that has developed for Sunday, October 15, totally unacceptable and not in the best interests of bridge or the parties responsible for holding the events.

On this day, three events, all worthy of the attention of Unit 430 members, were scheduled: 1:2-session Charity Swiss teams Abbotsford

2:2-session Charity Swiss teams North Shore Winter Club 3:CNTC Qualifying at the Haida Bridge Club.

At first glance, one might assume that these events would not attract the same clientele, yet over the years I, for one, have played in all three events at various times. This year, I would have given serious consideration to at least two of them.

The unit board has gone to some lengths to give as much advance publicity as possible to upcoming events and if in doubt, the Match Pointer editor is always well-informed in this regard. Hopefully, conflicts such as occurred on October 15 can be avoided. Doug Cowan

THE STREBINGERS TEACH BRIDGE

Judy Strebinger has been teaching beginner and intermediate bridge classes for five years now. She has 7 classes per week, and teaches year round. Judy teaches at the North Shore Neighbourhood House, (Delbrook school) and is sponsored by the School District.

I have had the pleasure of many conversations with this boisterous, fun-loving teacher, the mother hen of a huge group of beginners and many repeat customers. Over the years she has developed her own personal style of teaching that includes personal contact and enjoyment.as well as logic and sound principles. Here is a sample of her approach: "The first lesson, I have them deal the cards and then, starting with dealer, each must tell the others ONE thing about their hand. They might say "I have four spades" or "I have 10 points", or whatever. This goes around the table, and then starts again, where each person tells ONE MORE thing about their hand. This goes on until everything is said. It gives them a perfect understanding of what bidding is all about."

Judy also gives private classes, with a minimum of 2 tables, and will actually travel! Her fees for this average about \$5/person.

Judy's husband, Michael Strebinger, is a well-known local bridge expert (recent winner of the Canadian Open Pairs national championship) and we are told that he is available for Advanced Classes.

EVERYTHING YOU WANTED TO KNOW ABOUT THE WOMEN'S TEAMS

Goodwin-Hanson

For years now, a whole lot of people have worked with the Canadian Women's Team Championships (CWTC) in an effort to turn it into the great event it promises to be. Slowly, the wrinkles and kinks are being ironed away and this year, we, the organizers, believe we have at last coaxed the teetering championships into a form well-suited to BC as well as Vancouver. Following is an overview of the Conditions of Contest. Please read carefully and direct all or any questions to Marcia Christie, Zone co-ordinator (581-1554) or Jude Goodwin-Hanson (224-2210).

QUALIFYING GAMES These will run from November to January. Dates and sites are listed on the facing page. This year, we are running this stage as a SINGLE SESSION PAIRS game. Players qualify as INDIVIDUALS as in previous years. Our object here is two-fold;) to increase participation and awareness of the event, by 'exposing' more women to the game through the support of more and smaller clubs outside the majorcity centre, and 2) to improve the quality of the games at this level through the increased participation. The object here is to not only qualify for the next level, but to play games against your future adversaries. It was thought that it might be a lot easier to find a partner for one of these qualifying games, than to find a whole team. Also, running a pairs event is much easier on our always generous club owners. The previous years' turn-out of two or three teams not only undermined the legitimate 'qualifying' principles of the event, but proved very disappointing for club managers and participants alike. The addition of the two sectional Women's Pairs events, as a qualifying event, will also aid the above objectives - greater exposure, and increased participation. Note that the Sectional games will not generate income for the 'kitty' as we will NOT be increasing the table fees. We are hoping to qualify women through this event who would not normally enter the CWTC, but may, once they receive their slips in the mail. There are six games on the schedule; should be plenty of opportunity to qualify! Grab a partner and get out there.... patronize your clubs.

THE VANCOUVER WOMEN'S TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS March 3, 1990

Conditions of Contest details are listed elsewhere in this article. The game will be held at the HAIDA club. It will be NON SMOKING. It will be a 2-session TEAM GAME, round robin with VPs. (Please notes the condition involving a 3-VP penalty for failure to alert has been discarded, although we believe it remains in the CNTC conditions). Participants must have qualified through a qualifying game, and present a qualifying slip at game time. This event begins the CWTC. (Intermediate Stage) and participants in the Vancouver Championships automatically become eligible participants in the CWTC. Winners will be awarded the title of VANCOUVER WOMEN'S TEAM CHAMPIONS. They and other qualifiers will be invited to attend the BC CHAMPIONSHIPS.

THE BRITISH COLUMBIA WOMEN'S TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS April 7-8, 1990 Conditions of Contest details are listed elsewhere in this article. We are hoping to make this a BIG event, with all the pomp and respect due a provincial championships. The site will be the North Shore Winter Club, newly rennovated. We will be encouraging teams from all over the province to send their

women's teams down. We will be forming a hospitality committee and plan to help with transportation, provide hospitality and all the other good stuff associated with this kind of event. Of course the qualifiers will be informed of all details, and we hope that many more of you will volunteer to help us make this a great weekend, both socially and bridge-wise. We will need drivers, caddies, people to sort and duplicate boards, reporters, and all-round hospitality-type people. If we have enough volunteers, no single person will have a lot of work to do!

WOMEN'S TEAMS CHAMPIONSHIPS (cont)

THE CANADIAN NATIONAL FINALS Halifax June 30-July 4, 1990

This final will be a 22 team event. Three of these 'berths' are allot ed to BC.

MONEY There will no longer be any money sent to a National Coordinator and thus there will be no money turned back to the teams to help defray expenses at the National Final. This is a new format and especially benefits those BC Units who have been paying money into a kitty while never being able to enjoy the benefits. All money raised, through the various levels of this event, below the BC Championships, remains IN THE UNIT. Money raised in the Vancouver Unit will be used to subsidize those Vancouver teams that qualify for the National Finals. Money raised in other units could

very well be used to send teams to the BC CHAMPIONSHIPS.

Obviously, with the National Finals in Halifax, money will be a bigger issue this season (approximately \$1000/person budget). The qualifying games at the clubs will will collect \$2.50 per person (some of which is sanction fee), and players entering the club games should expect to pay more than that for their entry, to cover the host club's expenses. The actual entry fee depends on the individual clubs. Money generated through the qualifying games and the Vancouver Championships will be named as 'specific' funds and budgeted solely for the Women's Teams, Vancouver. Money generated through the BC Championships (Zone final) will be divided equally between the three qualifying teams. (Note- the Vancouver Unit Board will divide the Women's Teams money, specific and general, equally between qualifying Vancouver Teams).

OUALIFICATION Please refer to the Conditions of Contest to determine eligibility. The top 50% of the field, and all those with an average score or better, in the QUALIFYING GAMES, will be issued a qualifying slip for the Vancouver Championships. Players qualify as individuals. The formula for qualifying TEAMS for the BC CHAMPIONSHIPS is as follows:

#of tables at Qualifying games and Vancouver Championships X 16 Total # of tables in all qualifying & unit games in BC. Qualification for the National Finals (3 teams from BC) will follow the previous

condition that no more than 2 teams may come from one unit.

MASTERPOINT AWARDS Masterpoint awards for the Qualifying and all higher rounds of the CWTC will be red point awards, on a scale at least commensurate with sectionally rated events of the same size. The ACBL will determine exact awards for all events up to the National Final as sanctions are granted.

1. ELIGIBILITY AND ENTRY

A player, to be eligible to play in a Qualifying Round game must be either

i)a Canadian citizen at Sept 15,1989 ii) a landed immigrant resident in Canada at Sept

15, 1989 iii)a member in good standing of a Canadian Unit of the ACBL, or

iv) have received special permission to play in the qualifying level only.

An eligible player may enter Qualifying round games as often as she wishes, with the same or different partners .

A player, to be eligible to play beyond the Qualifying Stage, whether as a member, a substitute or replacement, must be a Canadian citizen or resident landed immigrant at September 15, 1989, must have earned a qualifying position anywhere in Canada, unless she has received specific exemption from the CBF Committee on CWTC Procedures.

A TEAM, which may consist of 4.5, or 6 players, is eligible to play in the Vancouver Championships (CWTC Intermediate Stage) provided each and every member of that team has earned a qualifying position, or has been exempted as described above. A player is deemed to have become a MEMBER of a team if : i) she is listed on the entry form of that team in the Vancouver Championships, thereby becoming an ORIGINAL MEMBER

A TEAM is eligible to play in the BC Championships provided that each and every member of that team has earned a qualifying position, or has been exempted as above. A player is deemed a member of a team if either i) she is listed as one of the original members, or ii) she joins that team as an approved replacement (see below).

A TEAM is eligible to play in the National Finals if all the above apply and a player is also deemed a member of the team if she joins that team as an approved augmentation (see below).

A TEAM ENTERS the CWTC by filling out an entry form for the Vancouver Championships. A team remains ACTIVE in the CWTC so long as it retains THREE of its ORIGINAL members, has not been eliminated in competition and has not, as a team, withdrawn from the CWTC.

Every team which enters the CWTC must name a TEAM CAPTAIN, who shall represent the team in all official capacities.

NOTE: It is important to realize that each player listed on a team's entry form at the Vancouver Championships is and will remain ineligible to play on any other team until the team of which the player is a listed member is eliminated from competition, at which point the player becomes eligible for use as a replacement, substitute, or augmentation. This remains true whether or not the listed member actually plays with the team in any round.

Teams made up of members from more than one playing area or zone must play in the area from which the majority of players come.

There are no requirements, in terms of boards played, for the continued membership on a team at the Vancouver Championships. In the BC Championships, each member of a team must play at least 50% of the boards.

A player who has entered the VWTC (Intermediate stage-CWTC) may not enter another Intermediate stage game in another playing area.

2. WITHDRAWAL OF TEAMS

It is expected, but not required, that a team which enters the CWTC by playing in the Vancouver Championships, will continue in competition until eliminated. A team which wishes to withdraw may do so immediately after the Vancouver Championships by notifying Marcia Christie. After the BC Championships, the CBF requests an explanation in writing.

A withdrawing team will be replaced by the highest ranking non-qualifier from among the teams which played at the same site.

3. CHANGES IN TEAM MEMBERSHIP

- a) GENERAL : The players, as listed on the entry form for the Vancouver Championships, are the original members of that team. No team will be allowed to continue in competition which does not retain at least three of its original members. Under no circumstances may a player be a member of more than two teams beyond the qualifying level, whether by original membership, replacement or augmentation. No player who has withdrawn from a team, and no member of a team which withdraws, may be used for substitution, replacement or augmentation.
 - A player who is used as a substitute on a team may not enter the event as a member of another team or be used as a substitute, replacement or augmented player until the team she originally played for is no longer active in the event.
- b) SUBSTITUTION: The temporary replacement of a team member by a non-member for a short period of play.
 - A team member may not have a substitute for more than one full stage of the event. A substitute may be used to bring a team up to four players.
 - A substitute must be approved, and not, in the opinion of the co-ordinator, noticeably strengthen the team.
- A substitute must be an eligible player as defined in section 1, except that at the Vancouver Championships, a substitute need only have PLAYED, not qualified, in a qualifying game.
- c) REPLACEMENT: The permanent addition to the team of a new member, replacing a departing member.
 - A replacement must be an eligible player as defined in section 1, who has never been a member of or played for any other team which is currently active in competition. A replacement must be approved by the Co-ordinator of the next level of competition, and should not, in the opinion of the Co-ordinator, noticeably strengthen the team. A replacement becomes a full-fledged member of the team she joins, in the place of, and assuming the rights of, the player replaced. The replaced player receives any master point awards due at the time of her withdrawal; the replacement receives all subsequent awards.
- AUGMENTATION: The permanent addition of a player or players to a team having fewer than six members.

Upon qualifying for the National Finals, a team with less than six players may augment with any player(s) who played in the event at the Qualifying level to bring its total team membership to five or six. The choice of augmented members is subject to the approval of the National Co-ordinator, who must be notified not less than three weeks before the start of the National Finals.

1989-90 FLIGHT B IMP LEAGUE FORECAST

Since Jimmy the Greek has become a persona non grata, one of our young Turks has been chosen to make this year's prognostications in the Imp League's top minor league. Flight B is made up of two types of teams; veterans either not quite good emugh or not daring enough to take on the major leaguers, and up'n'comers honing their skills, hoping someone in the majors will notice.

Now that last year's winning Bodlak team has drafted themselves up to the majors, the Flt B field has been left wide open for last year's runners-up, the THONY STIENNON team (Colin Collin, Joerg Schneider, Garry Skoropada). Stiennon has retained the tandem of Schneider and Skoropada, who always do well in team competition, but dropped the rest of last year's players. Instead, he has added Collin, a beteran all-star making a return to Flt B after an absence of several years. On paper, this group of seasoned life masters is the class of the league, but, as everyone knows, this game is not played on paper.

Likely to give Stiennon the best run for the money is the LOIS MAZUREN team (Jim Groves, Roselle McRae, Jim Sache, Dave Schmidt, Aaron Wolf). A previous incarnation of this all-Chilliwack team finished first in Flt B several years ago before fading in the playoffs, while another version surprised a few Flt A teams two years ago. The team is now back where it belongs and if it can field a team with four cylinders firing at the same time, it could be murder. Murder could also be the word for the team's schedule, which could see them playing nothing but away games. Since Mazuren meets Stiennon in the first round, this first match could tell the tale for the season.

A likely third place finish awaits the PATTI PRENTY team (Deirdre Cole, Mike Prenty, Jane Skinner). Patti is the only member left from last year's Metcalfe team which crumbled in the second half after a credible first half. This year, Patti has a new husband and two members of last year's winning Flt C team. If there are no marital disputes (the first year is supposed to be the hardest) and the Cole-Skinner partnership survives the move up, these young Turks could easily be the dark horse in the field.

Perennial Flt B competitors, the TAI ENG team (Rod Coote, Jim McKenzie, Fred Powell. Dick Simpson, Fred Takashita) are making another run for the roses this year. Picked for fourth, this team could finish anywhere as past reulsts seem to be either tops or bottoms. Hopefully, Eng's addition of previous Flt Ber Rod Coote and Dick Simpson to last year's four-man lineup will provide the steadying influence this team obviously needs.

Fresh off a victory in Flt C and now out to try their luck in Flt B is the JIM BALCOM team (Tom Bennet, Gordon Devlin, Bob Jess). Balcom and Jess have attempted to cope with the Cole/Skinner defection by recruiting Bennet from last wear's Flt C second place team and adding newcomer Devlin. Last year's victory should give Balcom confidence and he may surprise some teams who choose to underrate the group. The IMP League season has begun again, with 13 teams signed up to battle it out in FLIGHT A. This year, for the first time, bidding boxes will be available for all teams who wish to use them for their matches. To help the unit defray the cost of purchasing the boxes, there will be a small surcharge of \$1 per team per match, plus a security deposit of \$10 per team per match, which will be refunded upon the return of the boxes after each match, provided there is no damage. Boxes will have to be picked up from and returned to Greg Arbour, who can be contacted during the day at 681-1171.

Now for a pre-season scouting report of the teams who will be vying for the Flight A title:

DIVINSKY (2-1) Nathan Divinsky, Don Brazeau, Aidan Ballantyne, Mike Dimich, Gord McOrmond, Dan Jacob. With Dimich coming in for Mike Strebinger, this team will have to trade in its catcher's mitt for a couch. Either that or a good hypnotist. Brazeau is steady if unspectacular. A big break for the House team when he was unable to play in the semi-final last year. Ballantyne has plenty of ability but will never learn to stay away from those awful weak two bids and random pre-empts. McOrmond and Jacob are good but even they can do only so much, as witness the semi-final against House last year. The old magic may no longer be there. Divinsky is capable and can be very tough at times. Probably the best team in the field, but a bit short when it comes to IMP strategy. Not too much of a disadvantage in this field.

LINDSAY (3-1) Cam Lindsay, Bob Connop, Ron Borg, Cam Doner, Paul Hagen. The Defending Champions. Need one say more. Borg is coming off a great year (COPC Champion, IMP League winner, qualifier for the CNTC national finals until his team deserted him - you will just have to learn to play better, Ron). Rumour has it that this team has their minds on the golf course most of the time, but they still shoot par or better at the bridge table, and just when you think you have them beat, they hit a hole-in-one. Doner was a useful substitute for Jacob last year. The post mortems were mercifully shorter, anyway. One can safely predict they will be around at the end.

TAKEMORI (5-1) Mike Takemori, Dennis Dohl, Martin O'Reilly, John Bryden, Ben Takemori, Steve Vincent. Champions two years ago, they slipped badly last year, but were still good enough to make the playoffs. However, I don't see much improvement this year. No fixed partnerships, virtually no practice, and, unlike Borg, unable to intimidate by reputation. Dohl will have to go to whip, but his heart might not be in it after the Tigers' disastrous year. Yet do not be surprised if they scratch their way into the playoffs again. Another Championship would, however, be too much to ask.

HOUSE (8-1) Dave House, NPC, Anne Nagy, Elliott Netto, Paul Sontag, Helen Fournier, Les Fouks and Adrian Hicks. This is the same team, minus Greg Arbour, but with the addition of Fournier and Fouks (some 2 for 1 trades are better than others) which lost the championship match last year after leading at the half. Unfortunately, Adrian wasn't available to play the second half and the Borg machine was just too tough. Anne and Adrian can be a dangerous pair. Netto is fresh from a victory in the IMP pairs and Fournier and Fouks show signs of being a force to reckon with. With Dave masterminding strategy from under piles of dirty laundry on West Fourth and with Sontag deciding to show some interest from time to time, this team could contend.

CHRISTIE (8-1) Marcia Christie, Debbie McCully, Gerry McCully, Jim McCully, Doug Baldwin, Richard Christie. A legitimate contender from the depths of Surrey. One McCully is bad enough, but all three? I never know what any one of them has for their bids. And usually, neither do they, which makes them that much tougher. Marcia is the perfect foil for Debbie. She never worries about what Debbie has, or doesn't have. And if Richard and Doug can find catchers' mitts big enough to handle the knuckle balls from Jim and Gerry, this team should do fine. Stamina over the long haul will be the key here.

BETTS (8-1) Rhonda Betts, Laurence Betts, Greg Arbour, Jude Goodwin-Hanson, June Stenning, Larry Pocock. Veteran jockey back in the saddle after a two year lay off. Will need to go to the whip often. This team revives an old partnership after a two year hiatus. Rumour has it that their first outing at the recent sectional was inauspicious to say the least. The system needs work and so do they. Stenning and Pocock are an established partnership but will have to learn to win against tougher competition. Goodwin-Hanson has formed a good partnership with Stenning but they will have to learn to develop more confidence at this level. Rhonda Betts is always dangerous. Witness her team's decisive win at the recent sectional. School year distractions prevent her from playing at her best. Arbour will as usual be available to provide criticism, hopefully constructive, after (and probably before and during) each match. A real team player. Not quite sure how they propose to line up. A longshot team to be sure, but I expect a few upsets along the way. Patience

will be the key, for the opponents that is.

OSBORNE (50-1) Bill Osborne, Wilf May, Gray McMullin, John Reay and Danny Lee.
This group of Max Hardy clones will again learn that system is not enough, at
least not this system. Nevertheless, they will pull the occasional upset. May

the 2 over 1 game force be with them. Contending teams beware.

MCDONALD (50-1) John A.McDonald, Gordon Estrada, Doug Hansford, Ina Andersen, Ken Danielsen, Brian Dixon. Hansford and Danielson are an established partnership and can be tough on any given night. Andersen is defending Canadian Women's Teams champ, and McDonald and Estrada played very well in the morning knockouts at the Reno Nationals. Dixon should help. Still, all in all, it is hard to see how they will be able to contend. Confidence will be a big factor here.

GARDNER (50-1) Ian Gardner, Eugene Chan, John Mullen, Brian Russell, Nicci Charlesc Gardner and Chan have been trying to form a partnership and they will use the IMP league for fram. practice. Unfortunately, Chan can't play ZIA every day. He will have to learn to grind it out against mere mortals. The other members of the team are an unknown quantity (though Russell and Charleson have shown that they are not intimidated by the Haida Club experts) and could be tough for that reason alone. have shifted to a diamond and her second club loser would have gone away on the King of hearts). However, declarer knew

what she was doing (she has obviously seen me defend before). I woodenly continued with Ace and a small club. Declarer discarded her singleton heart on the third round of clubs and when Elliott ruffed with the Queen of Spades, he was end-played, forced to lead a diamond into declarer's AJxx or set up the King of Hearts for a second discard (along with the J of clubs) to take care of declarer's two small diamonds.

At the end of the hand I mentioned to Elliott that he could have beaten the hand by cashing the Ace of hearts at trick one and then switching to his singleton club. In any event, after showing this hand to others as a lead problem, it occurred to me about a week later (when I was younger, I probably would have worked it out in a day or two) that I could have beaten the hand myself by playing a low club at trick 2 for Elliott to ruff. This prevents the establishing of the Jack of clubs for use as a discard for one of the losing diamonds. Elliott can cash the Ace of hearts at trick 3 and exit with a heart, setting up one discard, but he must come to a diamond in the end. No doubt Elliott noticed my faux pas immediately, but was too polite to point it out at the time. In any event, we lost 6 imps (Elliott, if you are going to double with these hands, you will have to make better leads, or find a partner 16

who can defend better) instead of winning 10.

In my own defence, a low club at trick two would be wrong if partner held Q-QJ10xxxx-Axxxx-x or even Q-AQJxxx-xxxxx-x.

Another hand of interest involved a slam decision. With both vulnerable, Elliott opened 2NT (20-21). I held K109xx-OJx-Kx-A10x. Clearly the field would be in some small slam. There would be no imps to be won unless we could bid and make a grand. Should I try for one? My philosophy is that if partner needs all of his cards working to make a grand slam, then settle for a small slam, unless you are playing a system which allows you to identify partner's precise shape and the location of his high cards at a low enough level (a big club system with relays, perhaps). Starting with 2NT on these hands is one of the biggest disadvantages of standard methods.

However, if partner can have wasted values for his previous bidding and a grand might still be there, then some further exploration is warranted. In any event. I bid 2H (transfer) not knowing where this would lead. Elliott bid 3S, which tolay as denying a particularly good hand for spades. I should now have bid 6NT. But there are several hands which partner could hold that would make a grand a good bet. E.G. e.g. AQx-AKxxx-Axx-QJ. Notice that the QJ of clubs are completely wasted, yet both 7H and 7NT are excellent. With AQx-AK1Ox-Axx-QJx, 7H is not a bad contract. How to bid these hands intelligently to a grand is of course another story. Another possibility is AQx-Ax-Axx-KQxxx. With the last hand I would have bid 3NT (showing 3-card spade support with 2 of the top 3 honours and good controls).

I decided to soldier on with 4C. Elliott now bid 4D and I bid 5D. intending to bid 6NT over 5H, hoping that Elliott could bid a grand with the right values. How he would know whether he had the right values on this auction is not entirely clear. Elliott however bid 7S directly over 5D. He held S-AQxx-Ax-Axx-KQJx. Notice that 7S is on a finesse, but 7C depends only on clubs being 4-2, diamonds no worse than 6-2, (a diamond ruff is the 13th trick, without needing to take the heart finesse) and spades not being 4-0. By my calculations, a 77.5% grand slam with my hand as declarer. I can handle a 4-0 spade break on my right, though not on my left (not enough entries to both pick up the spade Jack and enjoy a heart discard on the fifth spade). With Elliott as declarer, my LHO could ruff an opening spade lead, reducing the overall odds to 73.66%.

With Elliots' hand, I would have bid 4C directly over the transfer. This would show a good fit for spades plus a source of tricks (Zia has written about this approach in a recent ACBL Bulletin). A 4D cue bid would show the big spade fit but is not otherwise helpful. Over 4C, I could bid 4NT (RKCB) and Elliott would bid 5C (3 key cards). Over 5D (asking for the QS), he could bid 6C (QS plus KC). I could now bid 7 Clubs which Elliott would be happy to pass with his good four card club suit. To a certain extent, this is pie in the sky after the 2NT start, and it is not usually necessary to look for a grand slam on these hands. What is important is that you at least recognize the possibilities. Would you have recognized the same possibilities if you did not hold the QJ of hearts (wasted values in 7C)? Would you even have reached a small slam?

To finish, the heart finesse worked and Elliott made 7S. We won 13 imps. If the finesse had lost, we would have lost 17 imps. 30 imps turned on the location of one card. Sometimes it is better to be lucky than good.

Your biggest problem here is the trump swit. You could try to drop the doubleton O, but that is only about 26% chance. Better, when you are missing 5 cards, to finesse (50%) But which way do you finesse? Is there a clue? Theory has it that people cash unsupported Aces against slams(risking developing a trick for declarer) only if they know a secret. In this case, we could surmise that West knew we would have to find a missing trump honour. So we decide to finesse West for the QH. But wait. Let us not get sloppy. Play a diamond to the Q.

and run the Jack of hearts. This will protect you against a 4-1 split. The Jack holds, play low to the 10, cash the Ace, back to hand with the KC, KH pulls the last trump and Dummy is high. A well-deserved top. Most declarers mad 5 on this deal. Being in 4 making 6 would have scored very well.

BRIDGE IS NOT ALWAYS MY PASSION

Many people agree with Omar Sharif - bridge, with its endless challenge and fascination, can indeed be a passion. Still, many times after a session or two of bridge, especially at the tournament level. I feel like I never want to play again. Fortunately, this feeling has never lasted. For some people, however, it does last and that is the end of their bridge playing. Why? Because the game was an unpleasant experience. It can't be the game itself bridge can be disappointing if you didn't do well and winning was your only objective - but it can only be unpleasant if the participants make it sa.

It is easy to get rid of partners you don't enjoy - don't play with them. Unfortunately, it is not that easy to avoid unpleasant opposition.

Let me emphasize that the people who spoil the game of bridge are very few. Most of the people we meet at the bridge table are friendly and courteous. Win or lose, it is a pleasure to play against them. There are, however, a number of players whose technique includes gloating, intimidation, card slapping and verbal abuse.

It never ceases to amaze me that persons who would not dream of criticizing, humiliating or insulting either friends or strangers in any other social situation in a public place, abandon all niceties at the bridge table.

Here is a typical situation. With no clue from the bidding and equal values in both majors, you decide to lead a spade against 3NT, thus presenting the declarer with the contract. By trick 3 at the latest, you realize how wonderful for your side a heart lead would have been - your partner knew it a trick 1 and so did declarer. Dummy (unless asleep) has figured it out by trick 6. Why then is it necessary for declarer, after scooping nine tricks in an unmakeable contract, to say "Wasn't there without a spade lead, partner." "Sure wouldn't have liked a heart lead."; "club, diamond or heart out and we're dead" - the list is endless.

Don't you love it when the opponents have made their contract due to a slip in the defence, and declarer can hardly wait to score it up before saying "Best defence beats this two tricks, partner," a euphemism for "Sure lucky we played this board against the village idiots," Comments like this serve no purpose except to antagonize the opponents and embarrass a sensitive partner.

Bridge is largely a matter of making decisions, hopefully the right ones. No one, however, is infallible, and after deciding a sacrifice is right and going minus 300 against an unmakeable contract, I really don't need to hear "Glad to be out of that one"; "We're down at least one."; or worse yet, "If you'd played it correctly to go minus 100 it would have been good for your side, we can only make 140." I think I am being insulted - does the speaker really think that I haven't figured that out? Maybe they feel compelled to point out to my partner how unfortunate they are to be playing with me!

Another situation that is extremely uncomfortable is listening to the opponents berate each other. The moment the last card is played, the recriminations start. The fact that there are friends or strangers at the table bothers these people not a bit. The overwhelming need is to point out to partner how stupid, blind and hopeless they are and nothing else matters. It is not always easy to get up and leave the table at this time, especially if you are North-South, I don't know which is worse - to listen to two people hurl insults at each other or to listen to one voice only while their partner prays to sink through the floor.

It is a sad commentary that the higher the level of expertise and the fiercer the competition the more likely it is these incidents occur. The friendly atmosphere of the Club level is not conducive to unpleasantness and it is rare to encounter it at the novice level. Does this mean that the greater our ability to play bridge, the greater our capacity for rudeness? I hope not. Most of it, I am sure, is thoughtlessness.

The game of bridge in the last few years has suffered from a declining population. New players must be encouraged to start and all players must be encouraged to stay. We all have it in our power to promote this great game by applying the intelligence we all have, not only to the game itself but to the comfort and enjoyment of our partners and competition.

WHY I GO TO BRIDGE TOURNAMENTS

Bridge tournaments are fun! Isn't that right? We all go to bridge tournaments to win and have a good time. An example of the fun and winning (sic) can be noted at the recent Can-Am regional in Seattle. It was a wonderful place for a summer tournament; in the heart of the city, in a beautiful park setting, within walking distance of many attractions, eating places, even motely, if you could dodge the formidable west coast rain drops. My overweight, over 40, smoking partner and I, both good flight C players, were playing this hand in an open event. This was not our premiere game as half way through the session my partner started having chest pain. But the game must go on. So-o-o, we come upon John Anderson sitting north and the bidding proceeds... pass by my partner, pass by John's partner, 1NT by me (as always a little intimidated by the big gunsat least I have the best 16 points I have had all tournament), double by John, (I knew it, I could feel it in my bones), oh well, not to worry, we have done our homework and partner is awake, if in pain, and he makes his bid: 2 Clubs * transfer to diamonds, and it is duly alerted and explained. John's partner gives us a top by bidding 2 Hearts (whew, now I can pass my partner's transfer and get out of this auction), pass, 3NT - John is not so willing to give up a top.

My partner on lead makes the wonderful choice of the 10 of spades. The full

After his Spade 10 holds, partner thinks (oh no !!) and makes the fatal switch of a small diamond. The rest is history, as anyone can see. After taking three top diamonds and giving up a diamond partner realizes his mistake and continues a spade. They got their top. I got a story, and had my ego spared from playing in 2 diamonds doubled, vulnerable, for the biggest number in the history of the world. ... Are we having fun yet?

(Editor's note : I believe big John would have made this contract no matter what your ailing partner chose to do. He knows the diamond finesse is either on or off. If it is off, there is no point in taking the diamond hook. If it is on, you must have it doubleton, as east has shown at least four. If east continues spades, John will win, play Ace and a low diamond to your King. Now his QJ will draw partner's remaining diamonds. You will get your 3 spades and diamond but that is 'all she wrote'. If partner had had the K10xx of diamonds, of course, John's play would not win him the contract, but then, partner would not have switched,)

You only need ONE finesse for your contract. An option to the finesse is to try to DROP a missing honour. You can combine your chances by first trying this line. The choice of which suit to do this in is clearfor clubs to be right, the K would have to be singleton, about a 6% chance. In diamonds, with both the A and K, the |

missing honour would need to be doubleton, about 26%. Give yourself this little edge by cashing the AK of diamonds BEFORE taking the 50% club finesse. If the DO drops, you don't have to take any chances at all. If you had taken either finesse you would have gone down. Squeeze seekers can note that running your major suits first will not work because you would have to prematurely discard from your hand. Although finessing is right when you are missing 5 cards, always look for that EXTRA chance.
