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UPCOMING EVENTS

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A few comments from my week at the Seattle Nationals.

The tournament drew over 11,000 tables, well above the ACBL estimate. It proves bridge is flourishing in this area and should send a message to the ACBL: the Pacific Northwest (read Vancouver) de-

serves and will support another national soon. There is a move afoot to bring the Nationals to Vancouver in the year 2,000. I hope this comes about, in fact, I would prefer a tournament here sooner than that.

Congratulations are in order on a number of fronts.


First, to Dan Jacob, Gord McOrmond, Rob Crawford and Larry Hicks for their performance in the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams. It was great to see two of the finest partnerships the Vancouver area has produced combine to form a completely local team and even better when that team was able to hold its own in one of the stiffest competitions in the ACBL. (The team finished sixth). For Hicks/Crawford, this showing comes on the heels of Indianapolis two years ago when they finished second in the same event. Two high finishes in three years properly ranks them among the league's elite partnerships.

McOrmond/Jacob also reached the overalls in the Open Board-A-Match teams, while Jacob and Crawford each partnered Aidan Ballantyne to overall placings in national pair events (Blue Ribbon & Life Master Open Pairs, respectively).

Ninth in the Reisinger went to Michael Strebinger, his second major accomplishment this year. Last February, the former Canadian pairs champion participated in the International Team Trials in Richmond.

Over a dozen other local players made the overalls in national events (special note of Cam Doner & Greg Arbour-third in the North American Swiss) and more placed in regional events. In fact, our winners pages list over two columns from Seattle.

The plethora of winners proves the



bridge in this area is as good as any. Our top players are as good as their top players. Our intermediate players are as good as their intermediates. And our junior players are as good as theirs. We don't have to take a back seat to anybody. Our players may not be as wellknown or respected as those from other areas only because they frequent less tournaments. When this district hosts only three regionals a year and one national every ten or twenty years, it is not surprising no one knows us. The lack of easily accessible regionals gives our players less tournament exposure than most others and makes the prowess of our players even more remarkable.

Speaking of good players, our unit again won five of six trips in the North American Open Pairs, finishing second in Flight A and first and second in both Flights B & C.

Finally, congratulations to all the players who helped out during Vancouver days at the nationals. We were the only unit given two days to host (of course, Seattle players were expected to do, and did, yeoman's duty throughout) and our players responded wonderfully. When I showed up Sunday, I saw unit members everywhere, all working feverishly throughout. Well done.

P.S. fr Doug Cowan: Seattle was bestorganized tournament I've ever been involved with. 10:30 & 3:30 senior times were great and should not be confined to seniors. NABC's are big enough to have two regional events each day, one at 1 & 8 (or preferably 7:30) and one at 10:30 & 3:30. Also, it's time the ACBL provided bidding boxes for all events and made their use mandatory above the club level.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As you will read elsewhere in the Matchpointer, we had an excellent turnout at the November Sectional at the Pacific Inn in White Rock.

The 495 tables in play likely represent a new record for a Vancouver sectional. As the site is quite expensive, we had expected to about break even on the sectional, the high turnout enabled us to generate a nice profit.

From January, there will be some changes in the Monthly Unit Games. Games will be held the first Sunday of the month at the Vancouver Bridge Centre (except that the April game will be held a week earlier so as not to conflict with other events). In an effort to attract more of our intermediate players, we will be stratifying the Monthly Unit Game. In addition, we will

create Unit Game masterpoint races for those beginning the year with fewer than 200 and fewer than 750 masterpoints. One of my objectives in becoming president of the unit 18 months ago was to improve the participation and quality of the Monthly Unit Games and I think this will help

even further in this regard. (Attendance is already about 150 percent higher than 18 months ago.)



We were fortunate in 1993 to have the tri-country playoff for the Burmeda Bowl here in February and the North American Bridge Championships so close last month. A fixture in local bridge for two decades, Lynn Fleming curtailed her play after becoming a working single mother three years ago. In November, she reestablished her preeminence, first dominating the Round-Up sectional with victories in both the Knockout and Swiss Teams, then reaching the finals of the Blue Ribbon Pairs in Seattle a week later.

"Reaching the Blue Ribbon finals is the highlight of my bridge career," Fleming says. "virtually every pair you sit down with has had their name in lights for a long time."

She relished the experience, noting "I haven't played bridge like that for a long time," but admits it was gruelling.

"I was really tired by the third day and so was my partner. You have to be able to sit down and concentrate for three days in a row. Not many people have the stamina."

The experience rekindled her passion for competitive bridge, saying her goal is "to go to another national (Her previous national was Vancouver in 1974) and place in the top 15."

She played the Blue Ribbon with a 23year-old Chicago girl she was introduced to by "old-friend" Bruce Ferguson just minutes before game time. In fact, most of her recent partnerships have been last-minute arrangements. Her winning sectional partners, Jym Galand and Peter Maclean, were both firsttime partnerships arranged at the tournament.

Although Fleming hesitates when asked to name her favorite partners, she lists Marcia Christie as her favorite female partner and Jim McCully as her favorite male partner.

The reason: "Because they thought a lot on defence."

That is important to her, noting "how do you feel if you work your mind over and figure out what declarer and partner have and partner is paying no attention?

It's really fun if you come to the right conclusion," she adds, noting "defence is more fun when it works because it's two of you doing it together."

Although specifics "depend on the partnership," Fleming plays a "fairly elaborate" 2/1 system with count on defence and Roman discards. She enjoys adding new wrinkles, especially when they work.

"Peter Herold and I discussed a new defensive convention in the car on the way down to Seattle. When it came up, we just grinned at each other."

Fleming prefers tournament bridge, saying "I like the social aspect. You can see people you haven't seen for months."

She prefers team games over pair events. suggesting teams "seem easier.

You can play more solid bridge. In pairs you have to step out a lot and get lucky."

Fleming began playing in 1971.

"I was going to BCIT and it seemed natural to start playing at lunch hour and after school."

A year later, she started playing duplicate, admitting "my hands shook" the first few years.

She enjoys the continuing challenge of the game, noting "you have a new puzzle to work out every time you pick up a hand."

Despite her recent success, don't expect Fleming at local clubs too often. She "can't remember" the last time she played in a club, say "I don't find (club bridge) as challenging and interesting."

It is also inconvenient.

THE FINAL SCORE by Bruce McIntyre

Keeping track of the unit masterpoint races using ACBLScore allowed the winners of the races to be determined quickly and easily following our well-attended Round-Up Sectional in White Rock. The listings of masterpoint winnings was well-received and is easy to produce, so this will continue at future sectionals. (I'm sorry about the small print, and much relieved that none of the smokers perusing the lists got close enough to set them afire.)

To avoid a threatened lawsuit, your masterpoint race tabulator regrets to report that, upon seeing what ACBLScore could do, and with a quickly-approaching deadline for the October issue, he hastily went with the first list the computer produced upon receiving the gamefiles, without so much as a quick check with the results obtained sans computer by the previous tabulator, our esteemed Unit Board Grand Fromage. A few of our top players suspected their published totals were a bit low, and it turned out they were correct. I tried to blame M. le President, writing that human error had crept in. He threatened litigation unless I apologized. I'm sorty. My results failed to take into account ACBLScore's methodology regarding two-session multi-flighted events, where masterpoint awards are sometimes complex. The result was many Flight A overall awards were not as high as they should have been and some players received session awards for the first session as well as overall awards for a two-session event, which doesn't happen. Correcting this led to higher totals for the top players (who often win those big 20-point overalls) and lower totals for some others. When all this was done the list looked markedly different than what was printed in the October *Matchpointer* but the leaders were still on top.

I was hoping to run daily updates and perhaps declare winners before everyone went home Sunday, but that was shot down by the directors as potential trouble in case of a score correction. Still, I hoped to have updates through Thursday on Saturday morning, and through Friday on Sunday morning, but when my team qualified for the Saturday morning KO final (only to be thrashed), that went out the window in favour of a little sleep.

The Phil Wood trophy was up for grabs until the last card was played Sunday evening. Dan Watson held a slim margin of 0.99 points over Aidan Ballantyne, with Doug Thomas 20 back in third place, and Mike Wilson and Peter Maclean just a few points further back. Wilson and Maclean won the top bracket KO to draw nearly even with the leaders, who'd won a few points along the way. The Sunday Swiss saw Watson with a six-point lead over Ballantyne, with Wilson and Maclean thirteen back. Ballantyne had expected not to be a factor because of the concurrent NAOP, but when only five tables turned up in Flight A, the two-day event was made a one-day event. Wilson and Maclean were on the same team, which effectively made it a three-way race, and when the smoke cleared, Watson's, Ballantyne's and Wilson/Maclean's teams all won six matches to tie for first place, and Dan Watson held onto his lead in a wild photofinish, in which any tiny swings among the three teams would have blown the masterpoint race wide open!

In the race for the Edie Bonnell trophy, there were six women with more than 30 points accrued during the first four sectionals: Bev Taylor (37.91), Stella Alliston, Alison Dorosh, Donna Morrison, Rhonda Betts and Jennifer Paynter (30.14). But it was June Pocock with a 36.85 point White Rock haul, who zoomed past the rest to win the trophy, finishing fifth in the Phil Wood standings. Blaine's Lynn Fleming had a mammoth 42.79 point weekend and needed only nine more to pass Pocock and claim the honours.

In the Phil Wood Under 200 race, Mayo Clinic doctor Brian Bleau had put up a number-24.21-and waited it out in the clubhouse, unable to attend from his new home in Rochester. With many front-runners playing the NAOP finals, there was a good chance Dr. Bleau's four-point lead over Rob Shelburn would stand up, but a number of other people set the good doctor in their sights: among them Craig Snelgrove, Prashant Pandit and Michael Neagu. None of the front-runners passed Dr. Bleau, although Shelburn and Snelgrove covered most of the deficit. But just as the champagne was being addressed to Rochester, a cry of "hold on" was heard from the gallery on the eighteenth green, as Ric Sumner completed a fantastic round, scoring aces in the Friday morning open pairs and third bracket of the knockouts. Three matches in the Swiss placed him 0.29 silvers ahead of Bleau (the per match award was 0.26 so he needed that final day to win the trophy). Ric's weekend tally of 16.57 more than tripled his year-to-date total going in!

The knockout teams produced another winner, as Nurdin Kassam won enough silver to make LM. Congratulations to all the winners. Trophies will be presented at the Winter Sectional in January.

SECTIONAL REPORT by Chuck Campbell

Table count at the Round Up Sectional in November reached 495 over the four days of the sectional (plus almost 100 tables in the three flights of the North American Open Pairs district finals).

We were surprised at the 33 teams entering the Bracketed Knockouts. Knockouts were once a regular feature at Vancouver Sectionals but were discontinued when the entry dropped to about four teams. With flighting and bracketing of knockouts, participation in regional knockoust has increased and we were delighted with the number of entries here.

There were a number of factors contributing to the high table count. Unit 430 does not usually get the Remembrance Day weekend for our sectional. Traditionally Seattle holds a sectional then. Due to the timing of the Seattle NABC, we were able to hold our November tournament on the holiday weekend. Because the Seattle Regional in 1994 runs from November 28 to December 4, the same situation will apply next year. We will hold another four-day sectional from November 10-13, again at the Pacific Inn if we can make appropriate arrangements with the hotel.

We will use the same schedule as last year and will start the bracketed knockouts on the Thursday evening.

The Winter Sectional returns to the Engineers' Auditorium in Burnaby in late January. This is the "trophy sectional" with trophies at stake in many of the events. We also use the tournament to award the Phil Wood, Edie Bonnell, and Phil Wood Under 200 trophies for most points won inour sectionals in the previous year.

The Vancouver Regional will be held in Richmond at the Delta Pacific in early April. This is a change in both venue and date and impacts on the timing of our sectionals in 1994. Sectionals will likely be held in January, May, July, September and November.

WHICH FINESSE TO TAKE IS NOT ALWAYS OBVIOUS

When we first learned about finessing, it seemed it ws the most wonderful thing to happen to our declarer play since sliced bread. What



we only learned with bitter experience is that there is a general rule about finessing-unless you have to finess don't! There are many times when a better method of play can be made and remember, under normal circumstances the finesse is the worst odds you can get at bridge. Depending on your outlook, half the time you will be right West but half the time you will be wrong!

The hand at left was played at a recent duplicate game. In the modern fashion of most duplicate players, South

opened a weak two bid which shows less than an opening hand and a six card suit. West had the perfect double but North's jump to game gave East the easy bid of passing, and that is where the game was played. West made the lead of the ace and king of diamonds, and when his partner played high-low to show a doubleton, he followed it with the jack, a simple suit preference signal to tell his partner he wanted a spade rather than a club return. Partner duly ruffed the third diamond and returned the jack of spades as requested, the top of a sequence.

South now had a problem. He had already lost three tricks and still had two missing black kings. Which finesse should be take? Even without the suit preference signal, there should be little doubt in his mind. Look at it this way. If the spade finesse succeeded, he would still have to finesse for the king of clubs, but if the club finesse was correct, he could discard his losing spade on the extra winner in clubs.

Because of this logic, South should realize any finesse is risky, but to take two finesses is more than doubly risky, and should be avoided wherever possible. In this actual hand South makes the contrct if he spurns the spade finesse and, after drawing trumps, immediately goes for the club finesse, the only logical way to make the contract.

This hand actually has two important lessons: Firstly, the suit preference signal given by defenders to try and ensure the correct return from partner, and secondly, and more importantly, never take a finesse unless you have to, and certainly never take two finesses when one will do the job.

Liz: In spite of all his health problems in recent times, Jay was always an excellent partner and opponent at the table - friendly, courteous and witty. Once, when his partner went down 1700 against a non-existent slam, Jay deadpanned to the opponents, "Is that a good board for you?" I believe Roman was the unfortunate partner!

Roman: Jay gave me the most important piece of advice any bridge player can get. When I would ask (usually after some disaster) "What should I have done, Jay?" he would simply say, "Roman, Just Pass!!" (*Liz:* Was that before or after the 1700 debacle, Roman? Sorry, just kidding.)

Roman: Yet, on the ferry to the Victoria Regional last spring, he talked about dying. Although he wanted to live and play bridge and make Life Master, he knew, because of his condition, that he was on borrowed time.

The last conversation I had with Jay, the night before he died, he asked me, "Are we going to play bridge?" When I replied, "We couldn't find a fourth," Jay's response was "Oh, shit!" I'll always remember that. He kept his sense of humour to the end.

final position on the list last year. Two more players broke the 3,000 point plateau during the past 12 months, Ev Hodge and Wilf May, and the unit added one more golf life master (2,500+ pts) in Derek Ward. Congratulations to all players and keep up the good work. You are an example to us all.

In a barometer event, all pairs play the same boards at the same time. However, in addition to the usual pressures of playing, a rather disruptive influence in the way of a screen showing the results of each hand and the standings of the current leaders make concentration nearly impossible. **Barometers are fun** but require massive organization and many sets of boards. If a barometer event was ever held in Vancouver, it was so long ago nobody can remember. Maybe, someday...hmm..maybe!

Congratulations also to the Seattle NABC organizing committee for a successful tournament. 11,456 tables far exceeded pre-tournament estimates. I can imagine the enormous planning and effort expended. **Thank you, Seattle**. However, as Vancouver also bid for this tournament, I wonder...what if?? In terms of bridge promotion and raising local awareness, nothing equals the impact of an NABC. I hope we get one soon. Our last and only NABC was March, 1974!

Impressing me most was the sportsmanship displayed in Seattle. Whenever a director was called, everyone remained calm and there were no signs of personal indignation. At a seminar on rulings, I was foremost reminded that the laws require a director be called IMMEDIATELY upon occurrence of an irregularity. Players who fail this responsibility jeopardize their rights. A director's role is two-fold, to apply the laws and to educate.

The Bridge Centre will adhere to these principles. Players should be comfortable in calling for a director. Players should understand director calls are routine procedures implying no wrongdoing. The call merely serves notice of an irregularity. No offense is intended and no offense should be taken. We expect Bridge Centre Directors to be a busy lot in the coming months but over time the calls will reduce in frequencey as players learn. As senior ACBL tournament directors point out, players WANT to do the right things but they cannot if no-one tells them otherwise.

What a pleasure in meeting Audrey Grant at the accredited teachers' dinner in Seattle. Obviously the future of bridge depends on successful teaching programs. Without question the future of bridge is in good hands with Audrey leading the way. Opportunities in teaching bridge are limited only be a teacher's own personal desire. Also attending was ACBL CEO Roy Green. People such as Audrey and Roy are approachable and very keen to help. Their encouragement and welcome suggestions give us much hope for the future.

With the recent NABC, NAOP District Finals and Round-Up Sectional extracting its toll; club regulars after a brief rest should be all charged up again for the legendary **club Christmas dinner** and game set for Friday, Dec. 17. This year the event will be flighted with an open division and a second division for players below 100 masterpoints. Dinner is at 6:30 pm and gametime as usual at 8:00 pm. Usual card fees apply. 

The Hog insists this report credit Jerry Malcolm with a fine game and a large mitt, necessary to catch the knuckleballs thrown by HH-I-T. Despite being on his best behaviour all night, HH-I-T could not resist a caustic comment on this hand and paid a suitable price for it.

HH-I-T's opponents were playing 16-18NT openings and South's 1NT rebid was passed out, the Hog maintaining an uncharacteristic silence throughout. His king and queen of clubs won the first two tricks and he continued with a third club. Declarer considered, played low and Jerry's jack won the trick, declarer following.

"Oh dear." hooted HH-I-T, "we've established the ace!"

The Hog's words were soon swallowed when he found himself on the wrong end of an endplay, winning the diamond queen after hearts were cashed! If declarer takes the first or second club, the Hog is left with a safe exit card; if declarer wins the third club and the Hog turns up with four of them, he also has a safe exit. The triple holdup ensured the Hog would be giving away a trick later on.

A new play sprung by the Hog on unsuspecting Future Stars was the "I'll Discard First" pseudosqueeze. 1 00

After 1C-1S-X-P, HH-I-T bid 3NT with the best stopper in the enemy suit he's held in some years. The ace of spades and another were led and he was in at trick three, having thrown away two hearts from dummy. The Hog now cashed five club tricks, throwing another heart, and then played his last club, calling for the discard of the heart queen before LHO's discard. LHO, down to T/A/Q72, was in trouble. Not knowing where the last spade was (partner was holding on to it), she decided (quite reasonably) that it was less of an evil to establish the Hog's presumed king of hearts and hope partner had the jack, than to let the Hog toss some puny spade onto the table with a disgusting chortle. Unfortunate! The Hog showed the king-jack of hearts and claimed the rest.



HH-I-T also related to us a curious method by which declarer can duck or win a trick with no difference to the final trick count!

"I balanced in direct seat with two spades, after the opponents had settled in two hearts on a forcing notrump sequence," reports HH-I-T, "they misjudged and got to four hearts which partner doubled. Partner led a small spade through J6 to my KQT74 and declarer's ace beat my queen. Later I got in and won my king, then played the ten to force a high trump from dummy, leaving dummy without trumps. Declarer followed to all three rounds of spades. A few tricks later, partner

got in with the ace of trumps, the setting trick, and led the nine of spades he couldn't have."

The director was summoned and the players were told to play the hand out. The Hog protested. "The contract is four hearts doubled. I refuse to play to this trick until I am told how many tricks we need to beat this with our self-inflicted handicap."




