## President's Message

What is happening to multi-level events? Years ago, full houses were common at Unit Finals. District Finals were well attended. Recently, however, attendance at these events has dropped alarmingly.

Why? It starts at the club level. In the past, you could qualify at many clubs in the Unit. Nowadays, few clubs hold qualifying games for the Canadian Open Pairs, Canadian National Teams, Grand National Teams, and North American Pairs. Fewer opportunities to qualify mean fewer people qualify and a poorer attendance at the unit level. Even many who qualify do not bother to move up to the next level.

This problem is not confined to our Unit. Units across North America are experiencing the same decline in interest and attendance. In fact, the Canadian Bridge Federation has gone so far as to qualify everyone who plays in a club level COPC game for the national final, in hopes of attracting enough pairs to mount a decent game.

Obviously something must be done to rekindle interest, or these events should be cancelled. Your board expends a lot of effort to put on Unit Finals of multi-level events. It is discouraging to go to all that work for little response. Many Unit members, under the direction of Jennifer Paynter, spend considerable effort in fund-raising to give the winners of
these events financial assistance to play in higher levels. Does anyone appreciate that?

If you have any suggestions, please contact any member of your Unit Board. Or lobby your local club manager to hold a qualifying game. By holding more club games, we will generate more interest. Remember, these are not elitist events, many are flighted to appeal to players of all calibres. In that vein, the CBF is looking at adding the GNT Flights B \& C to the CNTC to include all players in our national teams championship. This would preclude playing against our American counterparts but would mean district finals would become zone finals and often be held in Vancouver. That would make it more accessible for our members who now have to travel to Seattle to play in the next level. If you have any comments for or against this idea, please pass them on to your Board.

And it is your Board. You have the opportunity to serve it, decide Unit policy and help organize and manage Unit affairs. We are invivting nominations by May 1st. Please consider whether or not to nominate yourself or someone you know. We need everyone from Rookie to Grand Life Master, from the Sunshine Coast to Chilliwack, as I believe the Board should reflect the membership, which encompasses every level of ability and the entire Lower Mainland. If we get enough interest, we may even hold an election for the first time in years. If that is neccessary, all candidates will be profiled in the next Matchpointer.

## Good Habits

## by Ron Borg

One attribute of success in bridge and other endeavours is the development of good work habits. On play or defense it is recommended that you develop the habit of pausing before playing to the first trick. There are several reasons. Some practical. Some ethical.

## Dummy: \&AJT4 *J7 * AQ963 *J4

3* led vs 3NT You: $\uparrow$ K52 0952 * $85 *$ A875
Partner leads the heart trey against 3NT. (Declarer bid a forcing 2NT in response to one diamond and was raised to game.) Dummy plays the jack of hearts. Pause. Consider the lead, the dummy, and the bidding. Have you done that? If not, please do so.

You play the heart queen, which holds, declarer following with the six. You return the heart deuce.

Wait a moment, let's back up. Why did you return the heart deuce? Or did you? Sorry, if you did that you missed an opportunity to defeat the contract.

Let's take a peek at declarer's hand:
Declarer: © 093 A86 * KT72 *KQ3

Declarer, on the return of the heart deuce, will know the suit is breaking and will confidently set up two club tricks for the contract. But what if you return the heart nine and continue with the five? Declarer will note that the heart deuce is missing, but who has it? Has your partner tried to conceal a five card suit, holding the club ace? The point is, declarer has now been given the choice of finessing spades for the con-tract-an element of doubt has entered the equation. The contract can be defeated.

Falsecarding, both as a declarer or defender, is a subtle craft that takes time to develop. In some ways it is like defensive driving. You have to identify and recognize the situations that may arise. Plan how you will respond should that situation occur. And when the anticpated solution does happen you will (hopefully) be prepared to make the right move without undue thought.

What I recommend is that you get into the habit of reviewing the contracts where you were defeated and those where the opponents have prevailed as declarer. Ask yourself whether there was any play you could have made to make it more difficult for the opponents to get the right answer. When a similar situation arises in the future, you may be ready to give the opponents some unpalatable choices.

## How'd You Dream This One Up?

I have a chess book that gives an interesting game played to a victory on Black's 19th move. But what is more interesting is that this game was never actually played, except in a DREAM of a Soviet Grandmaster named Bronstein. I don't claim grandmaster status (I guess grandmasters dream of complicated trump squeezes and quadruple Grand Coups) but I did actually dream up an odd little hand recently, and remembered it when I awoke...

Following a rookie-master game, with masters sitting director was called, and made the ruling that the nine of North and West, a Committee was asked to adjudicate the clubs was a major penalty card. South played the two to
penultimate round result on board 10 . Being a rookie-master game, it was felt that the Committee procedure would be a good experience for the rookies involved, and of course there were many experienced players from which to draw a fine Committee. The Director and the four players involved were first invited to give evidence. The Director admitted being at fault in the situation and bravely gave the essential facts of the case, to the players satisfaction:

West opened ONE HEART in third seat, North DOUBLED, East PASSED, and South bid ONE NOTRUMP. West now bid TWO HEARTS, and North DOUBLED again. South bid THREE NOTRUMP which ended the auction. West led the heart king. At this point North put down the dummy, and went off to extend his smoking break. South played the four from dummy and West played the heart nine from his hand and the nine of clubs also fell to the table face up. The
complete the first trick and was advised of his options (require or forbid a club lead, or let West lead and let the penalty card remain a penalty card). South immediately asked West not to lead a club. West cashed the heart king and led the heart five to South's queen, the jack of clubs being thrown from dummy and the penalty card (now back in East's hand) being played from the East hand. South's queen of diamonds was run to East's king, and a club return to West's ace led to down three and a near bottom ( -100 was slightly above average for North-South; -200 was the same bottom). By this time North had returned and, given an explanation of what happened, appealed the ruling.

The Committee then asked to interview the Director and the four players one by one. They began with the Director, who quickly admitted his clear error in ruling the nine of clubs a major penalty card. A card accidentally exposed

RHO opened ONE DIAMOND, a smooth PASS by me and a tank by LHO during which he lowered his hand somewhat. I brought this to his attention with the accepted gesture. "Sorry, "he said. "My eyesight is not very good."

"Why not 7NT?" said I.

Making an overtrick. My request for a $\$ 100.00$
fee was politely but firmly refused! And my partner, Angela Fenton, maintains to this day that he might only have bid six if I had kept my big mouth shut. Who knows? Four out of eleven pairs in our section stopped in six!! That's the last time I hand out free advice!
2. We held:

North: 4 KJ963 * AKJ642 * - * 62 South: \& A Q9853 * A987 * AJ4

My partner, South, opened ONE HEART. Not playing splinters, I responded with our forcing raise, TWO NOTRUMP. Partner's rebid of THREE SPADES showed a singleton or void. After a non-Key Card FOUR NOTRUMP, partner bid FIVE SPADES, showing three aces, and I bid SEVEN HEARTS.

Should you cuebid shortness when it is the ace? The idea of Jacoby 2NT is to find out how well the hands mesh-if for instance you hold four small in a suit and partner shows a singleton, you
know you have no wasted values and the high cards we do have mesh well. If that singleton were the king, however, it would be totally wasted and showing it as an "asset" (singleton) when in fact it is more of a liability, would be wrong, in my mind. The ace at least is a sure trick, but opposite three or four small, two queens elsewhere would pull more weight.

Bidding 4NT with a void and a worthless doubleton is considered bad manners, but with partner having very little in the heart suit and nothing in the spade suit all I need to hear is that he has two aces for six to be laydown (remember, one of those cannot be the spade ace-or so I thought). When partner showed three aces, I was very surprised, and could now bid a confident seven. I was even more surprised to find that we received $151 / 2$ out of 17 matchpoints! I think a good field should get there!
(How'd You Dream This One Up? continued from page 4) which is lower than a ten is a minor penalty card (unless the player already has a penalty card in front of him), and because of this, there could be no lead penalty. A minor penalty card does not need to be played at the first legal opportunity. The only restriction is that no non-honour card of the same suit as the minor penalty card can be played before the penalty card. You can fly with an honour, or discard a low card of another suit, but the first low card you play in the suit of the minor penalty card must be the minor penalty card itself. The Director, while not trying to escape the blame, said that had North been at the table at the time the bad ruling was made, he would certainly have pointed out the error. He also expressed surprise that West, an experienced player, missed the error. The Director recalled for the Committee an incident a few weeks before in which West had politely gotten the opponents to agree that an low card was exposed accidentally by his partner, in order to help the Director rule the card a minor penalty card. One of the Committee members jokingly moved at this point to give the Director "average-minus," but overall the Committee thanked the Director for his testimony and apology to the players.

North claimed that his side was damaged by the faulty ruling. At trick five, after winning the king of diamonds, East could not fail to note the significance of South barring a club lead. Had South not been given that option, East would have had to choose between a spade retum and a club return, and might have returned a spade, which would give South eight tricks. North also expressed concern that the only experienced player at the table did not call the Director immediately the card was exposed, instead sitting back in his chair and thinking for a few seconds after the nine of clubs appeared on the table. North was asked how he knew this, having left for a smoke break after laying out the dummy. He said his partner had told him during the next round.

South was asked to explain why he chose to bar a club lead. He said that he felt that East might have the club ace, and a second heart to lead through South's tenace. South confirmed that he was the player who called the director, after about ten seconds. He said he asked West whether the director should be called, and West emerged from apparent deep thought and said "what? Yes, I think you should." When asked what he would do if East had led a spade instead of a club at trick five, South said it was clear that he would have to take his eight tricks and run, since East was very unlikely to have the diamond king and the club ace.

East was asked by the committee whether the barring of a club lead by South had any bearing on his decision to return a club. He admitted that it was obvious from the barring of a club lead that South did not hold the ace; therefore his partner had it. However, he did note that South had led his lowest heart at trick three, which might be interpreted as requesting a club lead. But when pressed, East could not recall the ranks of the hearts in dummy, the heart played by declarer at trick one, nor his own small heart. He admitted that West had mentioned leading his smallest heart later on.

West was asked why, especially as the only experienced player at the table, he did not call the director immediately and why he did not point out the obvious problem with the directors ruling. West said he was unhappy with North leaving the table to smoke, and considered complaining about it, when he noticed the exposed card and heard South asking him if the Director should be called. As West waited for the Director to arrive, he tried to work out what South must hold to bid as he did; probably not all 11 remaining high card points, a heart stopper (partner's nine of hearts suggested a doubleton, leaving South with QTx) and probably not four spades, so an 8-9 HCP 3-3-3-4 or 3-3-4-3. As West was working this out, the ruling was made, a club lead was barred, and the events causing the appeal were set in motion.

The Committee now deliberated (that's Committee-ese for "argued") for some time, so long in fact that I woke up before anything was decided. Did West deliberately not correct the Director's error, seeing that if a club lead was barred it would tell his partner where his entry was? And even if he did, is he obligated to correct a faulty ruling that may favour his side, if the opponents co-operate? How would you rule?

## Pat Landau

## Edie Bonnell Trophy Winner

The thrill of victory - the agony of defeat. The thrill of victory is certainly one reason Pat Landau keeps playing her favorite game-duplicate bridge. It is a thrill she experiences on a regular basis: last year, she won the Edie Bonnell Trophy, awarded to the women player winning the most points at Vancouver sectionals during a given year. She also regularly places among the top three in the Ace of Clubs competition, another indication of her prowess.

Nor are her thrills restricted to this continent. Before she and husband Louis immigrated to Canada in 1982, she was one of the top players, male or female, in Rhodesia, becoming that country's third Life Master.

In fact, it was the thrill of victory that got her hooked on duplicate bridge in the first place.
"Louis and I had a couple of friends who asked us to play duplicate (around 1970), we didn't know what we were doing but two days later I picked up the local paper and saw we had won. We went again the next week and that really got us hooked on bridge."

She considers acheiving Life Master status in Rhodesia (you need 150 gold and 150 other points) a major accomplishment.
"The maximum you could win at a club was haf a masterpoint for coming first and could only get points once a week. Even at a tournament (there were five a year) first paid only three or four masterpoints," she recalls.

Landau has experienced the pinnacle of success in both Rhodesia and Canada. She was on the Rhodesian national ladies team three years in a row (Louis was NPC one year) and, with Margie Neate, Joyce Peters, Allison Dorosh, Ina Anderson, and Kathy Adachi, won the Canadian Women's Team Championship a few years ago. She much prefers the Canadian approach where the players chosse the team. In Rhodesia, players are rated and the bridge federation not only determines the team members but the partnerships.
"I didn't play one year becuase they had paired me with a player I didn't want to play with," she says.

Despite that, she is not the first in her family to play internaionally. Her father played bridge for England in the



1930's.
So what does Landau look for in a partner?
"Someone with a good sense of humour. A person needs to have a good sense of humour to play with me," she says, listing Joerg Schneider, Doug Cowan, Ev Hodge, Donna Morison, and Peters among her favorites.

She plays Standard but adds a weak notrump with most partners.
"The weak notrump is superior because of its preemptive value."

One bid she insists on including in her arsenal is pass.
"Remember to pass," she advises, "that's a very important part of bidding. You can sit there with 20 points and RHO bids your suit, you just sit there and pass. Know when to come in with a double at the right time."

She thinks learning good bidding is far more important than the play since "you can rely on the opposition to help you play the hand but you can't rely on them to help you bid it."

As her high finishes in the Ace Of Clubs suggest, Landau plays a lot of club bridge. She can be seen at all of Louis's games and many others as well. She enjoys the social atmosphere and although she finds Canadian bridge more aggressive, she believes it is less competitive than in Rhodesia.
"I find the clubs in Rhodesia less friendly. If you don't win there, people look down on you. They are very, very bad losers. Being a good loser is important and a lot of people aren't."

It is something she has worked on over the years.
"I'm not as hard on my partners as I used to be, but a daughter and a husband are different.," she says with a chuckle, admitting that she can still be hard on Louis and her daughter, whom she is trying to interest in the game. In fact, her daughter's bridge teacher told her to "play with her father but never with her mother; I'd be too hard on her."

Too good as well, perhaps.

## The Finesse

## by Louis Landau

After a perfectly normal auction (2NT showed $22-24 \mathrm{HCP}$ ), West makes a perfectly normal lead of fourth high est of her longest and strongest, and the defence collects the first four tricks. West then exits with a diamond and the only problem declarer has is how to avoid a club loser if they break badly.

If declarer has learned his sayings ("high card from the short side") and goes over to the $\$ \mathrm{~K}$ and back to his Queen, he will then have the problem of how can he return to the table and take the proven finesse when West shows out on the second round?


To make this contract declarer should play his ace first. If both defenders follow, which is to be expected, then he can then cross to his King. When West shows out, he will be in the right place to take the proven finesse and make the conthe right place to take the pro

There is no point in declarer worrying about West having four clubs to the Jack. If this is the case he is going to go down whether or not he finesses. All he should worry about is if East is the fly in the ointment with four clubs, and he should take the necessary precautions to cater for that eventuality.

This situation is not always easy to see, and indeed, it is only made clear when declarer considers what is the worst thing that can defeat him that he can control. If either defender has four clubs headed by the Jack, there is no way he can make the contract if he goes over to the table to the King. However if East has the holding, declarer should be prepared to take the proven finesse if necessary, and the only way to ensure this is to keep an entry into dummy.

## Call for nominations

## 1995-96 Unit Board Elections

The Annual General Meeting of the Unit Board is still far off (likely to be held during the Summer Sectional in July) but some information needs to be given now.

Twelve people (plus, on occasion, the past president as a thirteenth, if not a member of the current Board) make up the Unit Board of Directors, which meets monthly to discuss and direct Unit business. Of these, seven Board Member's two-year terms will expire at the end of June 1995. As well, sometimes a Board Member decides to leave the Board in the middle of a two-year term. I know of no early decisions that have been made as to who will serve next year, and who will not from among the current Board Members. At the same time as these decisions are being made, there is a nomination procedure publicized in the Matchpointer, and in the past few years, nominees and outgoing board members have been at a happy equilibrium, and thus no elections have been needed. Just in case we have more nominees than vacancies this year, this is the procedure as set out in the Unit By-Laws:

Sixty days (or more) before the Annual General Meeting, the Unit Board selects a Nominating Committee of at least three active members, a majority of whom are not Unit Board Members. The Committee's function is to collect from the membership written nominations (with consent of the nominee in writing) before June 1st. Any paid up

## Goalie Practice

## by Bruce McIntyre (with help)

There are four deals discussed in this article, all with multiple questions, and in order to try to keep you from figuring the answer to one question by remembering a previous question, I'm going to mix them up, fuddle around with the spots and the side suits to make them look like different hands, and fire the questions at you in a random order, like a hockey team standing along the blueline taking warmup slapshots at its goalie. Because of this, I strongly suggest you write down your answers before looking at the answers section. For the most interesting deal of the quartet, I'm indebted to Cam Doner, who explained the pertinent points enough times until even a palooka like me had figured out what was actually going on. For the others, don't worry at all if your answers differ from mine: who else bids like I do, anyhow?

1. 4 - QJ75 *T8654 * J8 None vulnerable; RHO opens ONE SPADE in fourth seat, beginning an auction in which you and your partner pass throughout. LHO responds ONE NOTRUMP, alerted and later explained as forcing for one round, but passable if RHO has a light balanced opener. He doesn't; he rebids THREE CLUBS, and from here it goes THREE SPADES by LHO, FOUR DIAMONDS by RHO, FIVE CLUBS by LHO, FIVE DIAMONDS by RHO, FIVE HEARTS by LHO, SIX SPADES by RHO. Everything from four diamonds thru five clubs were control-showing cue bids. Your lead.
2. 4 AJT6432 $\vee$ KT5 742 * - You are vulnerable, and partner opens ONE DIAMOND as dealer. You respond ONE SPADE and LHO bids FOUR CLUBS. Partner bids FOUR SPADES and RHO bids FIVE CLUBS. What do you do now?
3. You hold: \& 8 AK752 AKJ875 44 Partner, dummy, has this: 4 AT $\mathrm{J} 943 *$ Q6 $*$ T8532. The auction, with both vulnerable, has gone ONE DIAMOND by you as dealer, THREE CLUBS by LHO, PASS by partner and RHO. THREE HEARTS by you, a raise by partner, and LHO bids FOUR SPADES when it gets passed around to him. Partner doubles, and you bid FIVE HEARTS which ends it. LHO leads the club queen, dropping his partner's jack. He continues with the ace of clubs and RHO pitches the nine of diamonds. Over to you.

Hold on-you aren't writing the answers down. Go back and solve each problem before looking at the answers or proceeding to the next, or you'll have too many hints. Do it!
4. A532 $\vee$ Q3 AKJ62 * AQ Vulnerable vs. not, you open TWO NOTRUMP (20-21) as dealer. LHO bids an unalerted THREE CLUBS and partner doubles, denying a stopper and showing almost enough to bid game. Pass by RHO. Do you bid game?
5. AKT9865 * 9 AKT85 * - None vulnerable, you open ONE SPADE in fourth seat. There are two reasons
why this is not worth a two club call: your shape and everyone passing reduces the chance that one spade will be passed out to near zero, and you have only four quick tricks and potentially more than four losers. Partner bids ONE NOTRUMP, forcing unless you opened light. Your call.
6. \& 7 Q73 * J6 * AQJ6432 At favourable vulnerability, LHO opens ONE DIAMOND, partner passes, RHO responds ONE SPADE, and you pre-empt with FOUR CLUBS. LHO waits his ten seconds and bids FOUR SPADES. Partner bids FOUR NOTRUMP. RHO passes. Your call.
7. * J932 - AKQ943 * T64 Both vul, RHO opens ONE CLUB and you bid THREE DIAMONDS. LHO and partner PASS, and RHO now bids THREE HEARTS. You PASS; LHO raises to FOUR HEARTS, passed to you. Quit your snivelling about the three diamond bid; it's your call.
8. $\star$ KQJT87 - KJ654 $~+97$ Favourable vulnerability, RHO opens a 20-21 TWO NOTRUMP as dealer. Your call; any bid you might make is unalertable.
9. ^ 7 Q73 * J6 \& AQJ6432 Same hand, auction and vulnerability as question six, but this time you are taken off the hook when LHO smirks at your partner's FOUR NOTRUMP call and bids FIVE SPADES. This gets passed out, and it's your lead.
ANSWERS (don't read mine until you have yours ready!)

1. The auction seems to indicate that LHO has the heart king, and not the ace. Also, since RHO opened in fourth seat with a mere one-bid, and you have such a bad hand, partner rates to hold some values. It should be clear that the queen of hearts lead may well set up two tricks on that suit. In fact, the queen of hearts is the only lead (except for a Rusinow heart jack) that beats this. Opener has AKT9843/9/-/AKT95 and dummy has J2/KT62/AQJ92/42. If you don't lead a heart, declarer ruffs a diamond high in dummy to pitch his, losing only the queen of diamonds. If you lead a low heart, partner's ace is forced, and declarer can ruff a diamond high as before and pitch two diamonds on the king of hearts and the ace of clubs.
2. Five spades is an overwhelming favorite to make and you should bid it, and you'll probably make it. Partner has $\mathrm{KQxx} / \mathrm{AJx} / \mathrm{KQxx} / \mathrm{Kx}$, so you make it easily if the ace of clubs is led, or led from. If not, you might lose three tricks in the red suits, but you have at least a $50 \%$ chance of guessing the hearts. There's more to this, of course, but I'm not telling you here because I bet you probably ignored the instructions and skipped right to the answers without doing all the questions first, didn't you!
3. You did well to pull the double, four spades might actually make. To make five hearts, you'll need to hold the trumps to one loser. If hearts are 3-1 this'll be easy. If LHO holds four hearts he wouldn't bid as he did, so we must assume that RHO has QT86 of trumps, and thus the first hurdle is cleared when we realize that leading a high heart on the first round cannot work. If we start in dummy and lead the jack, and then the nine, even if he covers
both times, we can lead towards the seven the third time to ensure just one loser. Or can we? This line requires three entries to dummy, and we have only two. The right play is to lead a low heart to the jack and queen, and then use your entries to finesse hearts twice. Don't worry about the possibility of RHO ruffing your diamond entry to dummy. That would give LHO a 3-0-4-6 hand and his spade bid would be speculative, if not outright suspicious combined with RHO's failure to bid a seven card suit. RHOs actual hand: KQ7532/QT86/93/J. Thanks to Cam Doner for this hand, the details of which I played around with for question seven.
4. Do you bid game? Do ya feel lucky? Well, do ya, punk? Go ahead, make my day. I'm your left hand opponent, and you are going down. Your partner has $\mathrm{xx} / \mathrm{Jxxxxx} / \mathrm{Qxxx} / \mathrm{x}$. Details later, but in faimess to those who witnessed this hand (before I began messing with the suits and spots...), I should mention that this fiasco did not in fact happen.
5. You could have a nice constructive auction to six spades as you saw in question number one (where I craftily swapped the minor suits and switched a few spots) and make the opening lead obvious, or you could take a different view: both oppponents have passed twice now, non vulnerable, and RHO couldn't open in third seat favourable. This seems to indicate that partner has some values, which makes some slam a good bet. To find out which one, bid SIX DIAMONDS. Partner will correct to SIX SPADES and you might get beaten, but only by an inspired lead. Probably what will happen is that you'll get a trump lead, as I did, for an easy claim when the jack of diamonds drops doubleton.
6. Blackwood? You thought this was Blackwood? Surely you jest. If partner has enough to even invite slam, surely he could collect more points by doubling four spades. If you proudly bid FIVE DIAMONDS based on your one ace, prepare for a disaster and a lecture and I hope you're not playing IMPs. If you PASSED (passing this is OK, 4NT undoubled is a good sac) or bid FIVE CLUBS, you done good, unless you bid five clubs because you play 1430 and this shows one ace. In that case, may I suggest stocking up on $6 / 49$ tickets? Shall I tell you what 4NT means? Not here, you might still be reading the answers before doing all the questions: as a matter of fact, if you thought that 4 NT was Blackwood, I wouldn't be surprised to learn that you've been peeking...
7. Don't pass without thinking about what's been shown in this auction. RHO has a two-suiter with probably eleven cards in the rounded suits. LHO could not make a negative double after the three club call, yet he has some values. Isn't something missing here? If RHO has at most two spades, and LHO has at most three, and both are great favorites to have less than the maximum, this means you and your partner have at the bare minimum an eight card spade fit, and it's likely a nine or ten card fit in reality. Four spades is your call here. (It makes, too: partner has $K Q x x x x / Q T x x / J / x x$.)
8. The question is, where do you want to be on this hand? Wouldn't it be nice to be defending

3NT? You lead the king of spades, and get in later with a diamond to run 'em. Is this likely? Sure it is: but it might be necessary to let partner know where your side entry is. So, since we are only planning to lead spades, not to bid them, we might as well bid THREE DIAMONDS in case it becomes important. This seems logical since the opponents are more likely to bid 3NT based on a diamond stopper or two than a spade stopper. I think three diamonds is right regardless of the actual result, which was...

...plus 130 after three diamonds was passed out, with four spades cold (and often doubled). After a three spade bid, some Easts must have bid four hearts (or four diamonds as a transfer), and saving turned out to be more than right. Still, plus 130 turned out to be slightly above average, as most pairs played in hearts. At least this way I got to see the confused look on partner's face when he put down his colossal trump support...
9. No credits if you peeked at the answer to number six before answering this one. You'll know by now that 4 NT wasn't Blackwood, so what could it have been? Here are the four hands:

If you lead a club (or a heart), declarer doesn't need to guess hearts to make this. The jack of diamonds lead gets two diamond tricks for your side, requiring that declarer bring in the heart suit without loss. A trump lead means that declarer has to play both red suits himself, which might get you three tricks. Partner's 4 NT suggests that leading the obvious club may not work here, and you should consider alternatives. Of course, a heart lead looks bad, so the alternatives and a trump or a diamond; either one may work. If partner wanted to specifically suggest a diamond, and thought it would go down with a diamond lead, he'd double five spades, asking for the lead of dummy's first suit.

4 NT has other advantages, too. After I bid 4 NT (well who else did you think might come up with that bid?) and LHO passed, my partner, Patti Adams, got the first part right, and bid five clubs. (She could have passed too, and I'd give up -300 or so happily in 4 NT undoubled, or correct to five clubs if doubled.) Five clubs was doubled and we got to play there for the cheap save. While RHO was working out what to lead, I noticed I was being glared at. I proudly put down my dummy after the lead, and after a few seconds of thought, my patient and understanding partner asked me what four notrump was (but not quite in those words). I was halfway through the full explanation when she interrupted and said "I was leading a diamond anyway!" No respect.

Unlike Flights A and B, matches in Flight C are all 24 boards long, with a different 30 -point Victory Point scale, so that a 72 IMP victory is sufficient for a $30-0$ blitz.

Why does the computer take two tied teams (Burt and Chan) and give one a $16 \%$ chance of making the playoffs, and the other only $1 \%$ ? It has to do with who they've played so far and who they've got left. Both probably need to win about 65 VP from their last three matches to snatch a playoff spot.

## CBF may take over the event

The Grand National Teams is an ACBL grass-roots event with three stages: Club Qualifying Games, District Finals, and the National Finals held at the Summer North American Bridge Championships each year. There are three flights: A is unlimited (and the national winners receive a chance to compete internationally for the U.S.), B is $0-1500$, and C is for non-Life Masters up to 500 points. Canadian players are not eligible to play in Flight A of the GNT, however, because the Canadian Bridge Federation runs a concurrent event within Canada called the CNTC (Canadian $\mathrm{Na}-$ tional Teams Championships). The CNTC winners represent Canada in international competition.

States and Canadian Provinces. Our club qualifying games for the GNT and CNTC are usually stratified into three flights, but the winners in A qualify to play in the CNTC Zone Final (usually held in Vancouver or Victoria), and the winners in B and C qualify to play in the GNT District Final (usually held in Seattle). And this year there was an added complication in that the qualifying period was not quite concurrent: as I write this, CNTC qualifying at the Club Level is over, but GNT Club Qualifying games may still be held (for Flights B and C only, of course.)

With this in mind, the CBF is considering a proposal where the CBF would run a three-strata CNTC. There are advantages and disadvantages in these prospective changes, and the CBF would like input from those players who play in these events. A meeting for all concerned will be aet up sometimes in the next few weeks.
