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

This situation is not always easy to see, and indeed, it is only made clear when declarer considers what is the worst thing that can defeat him that he can control. If either defender has four clubs headed by the Jack, there is no way he can make the contract if he goes over to the table to the King.

However if East has the holding, declarer should be prepared to take the proven finesse if necessary, and the only way to ensure this is to keep an entry into dummy.




