

## Make My Day!



Playing online IMPs with a new partner, you hold the West hand. Partner opened $2 \nabla$, South decided doubling was right, and you raised to $4 \triangle$. Not good enough. North bid $4 \$$ with no net-lag of any kind. But this was just a prelude, as your partner now bid $5 \vee 1$ Once again with no net delay at all, South bid 6s! Not to be outdone, partner doubled this! The entire auction took 15 seconds.

Partner led the $7 \triangle$, won by dummy's ace. The rest of the trick was your 8 and declarer's...jack? Trumps split 1-0, partner pitching the $3 \bigcirc$ at trick two. At trick three declarer, in dummy, leads...the $2 \$$ ! Your play. If you ducked, fetch your partner, who beat declarer's T\$ with his jack, and direct him to page 4. Otherwise, it's your lead (low clubs played to trick 3), go to page 9 .

## "Big D"

In early March Gord McOrmond and I traveled to Dallas, Texas to represent District 19 in the North American Open Pairs Final (Flight A), part of the 40th Spring North American Championships. We went south with high expectations having shown early
speed in winning each preceding stage (club, Unit, and District). In Dallas we kept up the pace and led after the first two qualifying sessions. Then came the final day. We battled gamely in the stretch and, lo and behold, hit the wire in first place by over a length (er, board). Weeks later we are still a bit stunned but very proud to have earned Vancouver only its second unlimited NABC champi-
onship (to my knowledge the only other was by the late, great Jim Donaldson who won the Fall NABC Open Swiss Teams in 1977).

This article provides a few hands from the Dallas NAP presented in quiz format. The deals illustrate that for us, "D" was for defense, not Dallas.

For convenience you are South in all deals. Your side is playing upside down signals.

## Problem 1

You are on lead against 30 after the given auction. You try the K (you lead K from A-K at the 3-level and higher). Dummy plays low, partner contributes the 7 (high $=$ odd number) and declarer the 6. What next?

## Problem 2

You hold, none vul. as dealer:

$$

You open 19 , doubled by LHO. Partner bids a weak 2 4 , and RHO makes a responsive double. Do you bid or pass?

## Problem 3



You find yourself on lead after RHO opens a strong notrump, passed out. You lead the $3 \pm$ and discover that, as usual, you have struck one of dummy's long suits.

Declarer plays low from dummy, pard puts in the ten and declarer wins the ace. Now declarer surprises you by leading the K® from hand. You win the ace, partner contributing the three. How do you continue?

## Problem 4

You hold, both vul.:

& T6542 \vee K862 \diamond A & AJ3
```

Your partner passes and RHO opens 30 . Do you bid?
Let's say you pass. Everyone else does too. What's your opening lead against $3 \diamond$ ?

Problem 5


More defense! This time you are defending $4 \nabla$ when RHO opens $1 \nabla$ and rebids $4 \nabla$ after your side competes in spades.

Say you lead the Q3. Partner plays the 6 (low $=$ encouraging) and declarer wins the ace. Declarer continues with two top hearts, partner playing 9-Q. Now declarer leads a spade. You grab your ace and partner plays the deuce (low = even number). You cash the good heart and partner pitches a spade. You now play the J\&, partner playing the 9 (standard remainder count) and declarer the 10. What next?

Do you attack diamonds or go passive and lead a trump (and in the latter case, do you plan to win or duck your club ace if declarer leads dummy's stiff?).

## Problem 7

None vul; you hold this hand:

Partner passes in first seat and RHO opens $1 \triangleq$. You overcall $2 \vee$, LHO bids $2 \star$, partner contests with $3 ९$ and RHO goes to 34 . What's your call?

Say you pass and there is no further bidding. You lead the K and appreciate your narrow escape when you see:


Your $K$ wins the first trick, partner contributing the nine. What next?

ANSWERS (Questions on pages 4-5)


Defending against 3$\rangle$, Gord led : top spade and I contributed the seven (high $=$ odd number of spades). After thoughful analysis he found the only continuation to beat the contract: a low diamond! Declarer won and was fixed. He could not draw trumps else we would cash 5 top tricks when he next led a club up to the king. So he led a club up early. Gord won the ace and gave me a diamond ruff, giving us two spades, one club, one diamond and a trump trick. A highly elegant down one gave us an average plus.


I was South and and decided to pass $2 \pm$ doubled thinking my hand was poor in the face of a misfit. When West passed also, Gord, who had intended to raise hearts at his next turn, decided to go for it in spades since he had a surprise or two for the oppo-
nents (a seventh spade and a heart fit). We achieved a cold bottom when we went down one for -100 , cold for five hearts!

A big part of our success was being able to shrug off such occasional disasters (though of course it's easier to absorb bad results when you're a front runner).


I led a low spade against 1 NT ( $15-17 \mathrm{HCP}$ ). Declarer played low from dummy and captured Gord's ten with the ace. Then he led the $\mathrm{K} \varnothing$ out of hand and I had to win the ace. On this trick Gord played his lowest heart in anticipation of my problem. It was obvious that I'd be looking to shift since continuing spades could set up a trick for declarer. Gord's low heart was meant as suit preference for clubs, the lower ranking of two logical alternatives. I obliged by playing a club and we quickly set up seven tricks. It's true that declarer was unlikely to make his contract on most defenses but helpful carding such as Gord produced here saves brain power, builds trust, and helps a partnership get through four grueling, pressure packed sessions.


My pass of $3 \diamond$ was somewhat conservative but Gord was a passed hand and it looked dangerous to bid at that vulnerability. Besides, Gord could always balance if he wanted to. On lead against $3 \diamond 1$ decided to have a look at dummy rather than guess a major so I tried the At. Gord
played the eight and I continued with a club to his queen. He now found the key switch to the JV while he still had the spades under control. Declarer played the queen and I covered with the king won in dummy with the ace. RHO now did well to lead a diamond to the jack forcing my ace. After cashing our winners we had to put him in dummy (the heart nine set up with my eight onside). Declarer took another successful diamond finesse and got out for -200 . Still, our accurate defense netted almost all the matchpoints.

You led the Q4 against 49. Dummy plays low, partner the 6 (low = encouraging) and RHO wins the ace. Declarer now plays off two top hearts, partner playing 9-Q, then leads a spade. You win the ace as partner contributes the 2 (low $=$ even number if count). You cash the good heart, pard pitches a spade. Now the J $\boldsymbol{\text { L }}$, partner playing the 9 and declarer the 10 . What now?

For a change I'm giving a hand from the perspective of our opponents. In practice South continued a third club. Gord, who was declaring for our side, ruffed in hand and had nothing better to do than play off the As hoping for a miracle. Bingo! When the king fell he had 10 tricks and an average plus. The winning defense is to play another spade instead of a third club. This gives declarer a losing option of winning in dummy and taking a losing diamond finesse. Would Gord have smelled the proverbial rat? We felt lucky not to have been tested!

We defended $4 \stackrel{\text { d doubled when West opened } 1 \$ \text { in }}{ }$ third seat and his partner hung him. Gord led the KY after overcalling hearts and 1 let him hold the trick. He continued with the 78 . I won and was faced with a problem: should I attack diamonds? There was some risk in that since, in the worst case scenario, declarer could have something like:

With that layout a diamond shift would give away the contract. Instead I'd have to exit passively with a trump, duck the club lead from dummy (if I rise with the ace, declarer has a ruffing finesse in clubs to get rid of dummy's diamond loser). When faced with this type of problem, look for partner's help. His second heart should have been suit preference since he knows you're going to win the trick and wonder what to do. The $7 \bigcirc$ (a high spot) showed preference for diamonds rather than clubs. I returned a low diamond and we built two diamond winners before declarer could establish clubs. Our +500 was a clear top.

## Going To The Show

 by Felipe HernandezThe Nationals were coming!
I called up my favourite partner.
"The Nationals are coming!"
"I know. I'm going for all ten days."
"Gee, I can only make it for one weekend."
"Why don't we play on the final day. There's a Swiss Teams event that would be fun."
"Can we get teammates?"
"Sure I'll a arrange it."
"Great. I'll see you there."
"There" was Seattle, Washington. The year was 1993. Up to that point, my exposure to a North American Bridge Championship (aka "National") had been reading about it in The Bulletin, the ACBL's monthly membership zine. Occasionally a generous soul, upon returning from some distant city, would provide our local club with a set of the
bulletins that are published daily at the tournament by the ACBL staff. I would scour these for interesting titbits, while reading about the crowning of some team or another as champions of the Vanderbilt, or Spingold, or Reisinger. I had been unable to attend these tournaments but all that was about to change.

I set out early on Sunday morning. I was not going to be late for my first nationally rated event. The drive took the usual three hours and after finding parking, I walked over to the Convention Centre where I was to meet my partner. "Hunt for" turned out to be a more accurate assessment. People were everywhere. I had arrived about 45 minutes before game time and players were milling about, getting entries, discussing system, all the usual stuff you see at the smaller tournaments.

But these weren't the usual collection of players! Over there was Eric Rodwell, talking to Jeff Meckstroth, winners of countless events. Bobby Wolff, at that time the ACBL president, hurried by probably wondering where Bob Hamman was. And here was Ron Anderson

First of all, the bidding. Did you find the winning 3NT bid over 34? I wasn't up to it but at least I didn't bid 4\%!

Against $3 \perp$ I led $\mathrm{K} \leftrightarrow$. Dummy played the singleton, partner the nine and declarer the three. With that stiff in dummy it looked right to lead trumps but I was reluctant to do so from $£ \mathrm{Kx}$ lest I blow a natural trump trick. Could partner have the $\mathrm{A} \$$ on the bid-
ding? It seemed unlikely since he was already marked with the At and RHO had opened. As I sat there stewing it dawned on me that a switch to the $\mathrm{K} \pm$ into declarer's A-Q might not cost. Say partner has as little as $9 x x$. Declarer uses his ace to win my king, then uses dummy's $\& J T$ to ruff clubs. Now partner's 9 is promoted! After debating myself as to whether I was man or mouse, I put the $\mathrm{K} \triangleq$ on the table. It held! We quickly cleared trumps and scored up +50 . This turned out to be an average minus since our opponents had stolen one from us. Still, -140 would have been a bottom and we salvaged some matchpoints. They all add up!

## SUMMARY

There's an old saying that it's defense that wins championships. In Dallas it seemed like we were defending almost all the time! Our signaling (did you note all those contexts for suit preference?) and partnership trust was tested on these and many other deals. I think we performed well considering we hardly ever play together. So how do you rate your own performance?
(McB: This year's NAOP is just beginning with club level qualifying as this Matchpointer appears. For details see the article on page 29)
and Sabine Zenkel, the very two who had co-authored the book on preempts 1 happened to have been reading on the drive down. I still had the book clutched in my hand so I thought "Why not?" and walked up to them and asked them to sign it for me. They were most gracious, chatting with me for a couple of minutes. Soloway, Passell, Goldman, Levin, Kaplan, Kay, Zia. They were all there. It was like being invited to a celebrity party after the Oscars. (Okay, maybe not quite that glamorous - but you get the idea.)
"Over here!" my partner yelled above the din. I spotted him and fought my way through the crowd to reach him. He had arranged for us to play in the Victory Point Swiss. He asked me if I had registered. "Registered? What's that?" I asked. He explained that upon arriving at a large tournament, a player "signs in" at the registration desk. It is usually staffed by the local District or Unit so that questions about restaurants or sight-seeing can be answered. It also allows your relatives back home to reach you if the need should arise. There is typically a small gift presented and you walk away feeling that you have been welcomed not only to the tournament but to the area.

As we walked over to get our entry, we passed a number of different booths. There was a partnership desk of course and a large display of books for sale. There were also people selling other bridge paraphernalia: T-shirts, pins, pencils, etc. There was a hospitality desk, and a membership desk, and a directors table, and other tables all with cheerful-looking people behind them dispensing advice or instructions. A large sandwich board announced the guest speakers for the day. Everything seemed quite organized and everyone seemed to be having fun.

Our teammates were waiting for us. When I walked

into the playing area I was again taken aback. The sheer size! Sure I had been in big rooms before, but not when they were filled with what had to be close to 800 tables. It was huge. Row after row carefully laid out with table markers, bidding boxes, convention cards, etc. Scattered throughout were section markers that looked like medieval standards with printouts flapping below them. Of course, in a room this size the 26 letters of the alphabet aren't enough. I remember seeing Section UU and YY. I recalled the first time I entered B.C. Place Stadium and how I had been awed by the enormity of it. The feeling this day was the same.

We finished second in our flight in the Swiss. A decent debut. Later that evening, as I drove back to Vancouver with my partner, we were caught in a white out. We pulled over and let the storm pass. Somehow that was fitting. The day had been tumultuous for me. Mother Nature was letting me know that although I had overcome my first hurdle I would face many others along the way; that it was the journey and not the destination that mattered.

Since then I have attended several other Nationals and have found them all to be exciting, challenging, and rewarding. I have met many special people and made many good friends. And I have always felt welcomed by the organizers and volunteers who staff these events. Our city has an opportunity in 1999 to play host to the rest of the ACBL for the Spring North American Bridge Championships. It will also give many players their first experience competing at a national tournament. I envy these players. They are at the beginning of the adventure. My teammates that day were Gary Phelan, Doug Thomas, and Duane Tilden. Thanks, guys. I will cherish the memory of that day always.
[From the cover] Did either you or your partner find the heart lead at trick three to beat the slam? Ducking a club means declarer has the $\mathrm{A} \bigcirc$-if he has three to the ace he has an easy twelve tricks, six trumps, two ruffs, and four side suit winners. So he must have only two diamonds to be trying to set up the 4\&. Your only chance is to hope that he is $6-2-2-3$ and not $6-1-2-4$. West might be decieved, by East's $5 \bigcirc$ bid and failure to lead an honour, into thinking that East started with a seven card suit. If West ducks (chancing that this is not an out-and-out swindle lead toward the J\&), East wins but may well think from the cards played that North has K-J of hearts. Give North credit, most got to this "impossible" slam, but without a heart lead it's cold after clubs split 3-3. With a heart lead, North needs the clever falsecard to have any chance of getting the switch.

## The Defensive Holdup

## By Louis Landau

The defensive holdup is a very important part of bridge, and this hand is a good example of what it is all about. It comes straight from Audrey Grant's ACBL Diamond Series and as such should be considered quite basic. However, as in all bridge hands, there is always something extra to be discovered!

The bidding is according to Standard American, with the response of 28 showing a hand with not even a king, and as South has 26 points and a balanced hand, the rebid of 3 NT is almost automatic. Some people will open 3 NT on this type of hand, but the final contract and declarer will still be the same. The opening lead of the $\mathrm{J} \Phi$, top of a sequence, will also be almost automatic for most West players, and South has to look at the hand and make a plan. He has three tricks in spades and two in hearts, so four more tricks are needed to make the contract. The obvious place to look for them is diamonds.

While he still has control of all the suits, he should set about driving out the $A \diamond$, and so make the necessary four additional tricks. But if East is awake, she should realize the plan and duck the first diamond, awaiting the count of the suit. When West shows out on the second diamond, East can count three diamonds in the declarer's hand, and as there is no apparent entry to

dummy outside diamonds, all she has to do is duck a second time, and dummy's beautiful diamonds are stranded and useless to declarer.

At this stage of the game, declarer has to be the one
 who is awake. He should also realize when West shows out on the second round, that he is not ever going to make more than two diamond tricks, and therefore still needs two more for his contract. The solution is quickly found: abandon the diamond suit and switch to clubs! It does not mater when the opposition takes their A\$, he is guaranteed two club tricks, and the contract will make. To look at it in a different way, there is normally more than one way to play a hand. When one doesn't work, you can often try the second one.

As a matter of interest, in duplicate bridge, if West is being kind and
 takes her A $\triangle$ early, she will almost certainly be giving you a top board! Now, when you regain the lead you can also set up the clubs to make three
spades, two hearts, four diamonds and two clubs for an excellent score of 460 !
All in all, a very simple Audrey Grant "Beginners" hand becomes a very interesting hand at duplicate.

First, board 3 from the Friday Evening pairs-these were the NorthSouth hands. Our Precision auction went:

North can virtually count on nine tricks on the minors because of the known five-card diamond suit. That seems easy enough, but very, very few pairs (none in our section) found the laydown grand! How would you and your favorite partner bid these hands, and would you get there?

There are hands which are ideal for your system like the above, others can be a nightmare! Playing Precision with trump and suit asking bids, our auction went as shown:
(1) $16+$, artificial (2) $8+$, but a practical maximum of 10 since this is a passed hand, 5 or more spades
(3) $20+$ and asking for the quality of partner's trumps

## Call for Nominations Unit DINO Rep 1998-2000

Unit 430 has two representatives on the District Nineteen Organization (DINO) Board of Directors, currently held by Jennifer Ballantyne and David Schmidt. The DINO Board is responsible for District-wide championship events and Regional tournaments, and will certainly have some input into the NABC here in Vancouver in 1999. The terms are for three years, and David Schmidt's term expires at the end of this year. His replacement or renomination shall
be decided by the Unit 430 Board of Directors at the November or December meeting. The job requires attending most of the District Nineteen Regional Tournaments, as the Board Meetings are held in conjunction with Regionals. David has indicated a desire to run again for the job. Any Unit 430 member may suggest another nominee for the Unit Board to consider. Nominees must, of course, be ACBL members residing in the Unit 430 area, and agree to serve if nominated. Nominations may be sent to any Unit Board Member before the end of October.

At the other table North opened 2NT and South transferred and then raised to 4 S . Would you visualize the slam opposite a passed hand?

Have you got it yet? Did you jettison the king of spades under the ace? You need to find the king of hearts onside, and if it is Kxx or Kxxx you need two entries to dummy-the queen and ten of spades- to take two finesses. Here's the complete hand:

## Play by Play by Bruce McIntyre

The following is a simple observation about experts and beginners from someone who is neither:

Well, welcome to the Stratified Pairs. Today, experts, velerans, novices, and rookies will play against one another in a unique kind of contest where everyone is eligible for the grand prize, but the longshots have secondary prizes of their own. Here's an interesting-looking fable, where four veterans have just finished playing the first board of the round, and are starting on the second. We're a little late and didn't get a partner...mind if we sit down and watch? Thanks.

There's a first-seat two spade opener, after the skip bid warning, and now Jack Starr is taking his mandatory ten second pause, which, actually, uh, ended, uh, quite some time ago-oh, now he's doubling. And now they get to 3NT, and we see Jack's problem-he had only three hearts. Hmm, interesting, his partner Ace Jones had only Jxx as a stopper and it's a good thing Jack had a spade honour. Well, looks like 430. We've got time before the next round-wonder if the Banks's will ask about the odd bidding.

Ah yes, Mr Banks is calling for the Director. Nothing grumpy like, just a calm call-in fact, Ace is encouraging it, in a friendly sort of way, you know, and, well, here's the Director. Mr Banks tells the whole story, so quietly that nobody nearby can even hear. The Director is looking at Ace's hand, must be wondering why he didn't bid hearts again over the 3NT call. Mrs Banks agrees with Ace that passing 3NT is right, but there was that long hitch before the double. Well, the Director is going to look at the hands and make a ruling eventually. Mr Banks is agreeing with Ace that ir's a tough call. Well, at least nobody's got-
ten their nose out of joint over this- the Director will sort it out and figure out whal's fair. Off we go for round two.

Well, here are Arnie and Barney, who must be-yes, they've just menfioned it to Mrs Banks as Mr Banks gets the boards-playing their first open game at a tournament. And another skip, and it's another two spade opener: oops, Barney doubled right away without waiting like he's supposed to. Four hearts, just like that. (Hope Barney's got hearts!) Ace of spades is the lead and it holds the trick and there's quite a dummy, I make that a, what, an eighteen count? Nope, only seventeen. Mrs Banks is thinking about what to do now, there's the king of spades, and-and Arnie is claiming, ruffing and leading trumps and losing the ace and king. That's not a very strong hand he's showing, especially for a leap to four hearts over the double. Looks like a six count, plus the singleton spade. Pretty light.

Whoops! Nearly fell off my chair there-Mr Banks yelled for the Director so loud I was startled. Arnie and Barney are kind of shook up. Wow, he's not very happy at all, hey, c'mon, not so loud, you're giving away the whole hand to the whole room. Now Mrs Banks is claiming-loudly-she might have gotten a diamond ruff if she hadn't assumed that Arnie had some stuff. My goodness, surely this is next to nothing, at most tables ifll go two spades, double, pass, three hearls, pass, four hearts. Barney has after all a great looking seventeen count. The Director is trying to get the Banks calmed down a bit now, and he's looking at Arnie's convention card-Mrs Banks is nearabouts shouting, some argument about Leben-soh1-Mr Banks is claiming he'd have played a different card at trick one if the bidding had been different. I guess the next North now knows what to play at trick one. Wow. Golly.

OK, the Director's decided to look at this one as well, and wow are the

Banks's ever angry-they seem to think he should make the ruling like it's obvious or something, even without looking at the hands. Barney's picked up the next hand and is sorting it-a INT opener, a seventeen count. Oh, maybe not, two small doubletons, hearts and-hearts? He's missorted it, he's got five suits. Hey-he passed this in first seat. Oh dear, now he sees ithe's starting to shake, and resort, and... Oh, now that was uncalled for I think-Mr Banks passed it out and then faced his four count and asked who passed an opener, in a sneering kind of way. And now Barney's left the table. The other three have faced their hands-and now off goes Arnie to figure out what happened.

So tell me: Why were the Banks's reactions to two very similar situations so vastly different? What turned a casual Director call on the first deal into a verbal brawl on the second? Why did the Banks assume that they'd been deliberately done in by the inexperienced pair, yet empathize with the problem that Ace Jones had when his partner committed a tempo break? And why did they trust the Director to get the first one eventually right, yet were outraged at not getting a split-second decision on the second? I don't think this is an exaggeration: I've seen it happen many times, and it's not just the high-end players at fault. Arnie and Barney might go back to their 0-300 game and go berzerk against a $0-20$ pair who don't explain their conventions clearly.

And tell me this: How long do you think it'll be before Arnie and Barney play in another open game?

Our game is dying slowly. If we don't attract new players, competitive bridge will cease to exist. This doesn't mean you have to go out and teach your neighbor how to play. We have several dozen talented people doing a fine job in that department. But it does mean you-and I-have to wel-
come new developing players with open arms. Their ethical standards are not as finely tuned as yours are, but we have trained Directors to explain to them the rules and the ethical standards. Just as it is not your job to teach the opponents at the table, nor is it your job to explain ethics to them if they should slip up. It's impossible to do so, no matter how fair-minded you are, because you have matchpoints at stake on the hand and there is a conflict of interest which makes you a very impartial observer.

Call the Director if there is any problem. Do it in such a way that nobody is embarassed or intimidated. Never assume that you've been deliberately done in: suspecting foul play will get you nowhere and will hurt your game. (Ask the pair who caught Reese and Schapiro using the infamous finger signals in the World Championship how they fared in the tournament.)

There is another, equally disturbing variant to the above story: in it the Banks don't call the Director, and instead they just show their disgust at the ethical lapse of Arnie and Barney by body language or even by rude comments. Then at the dinner break they complain loudly about the situation to all of their friends, and they name names, and Arnie and Barney get "the treatment" all through the second session for no apparent, and no good reason. If you see this variant being played out by anyone, ask them why they didn't call the Director. Ask them whether they would like to have their own unintentional ethical lapses punished through the grapevine in this sordid manner.

Trust the Director to make the right call. You need not even agree with the Director-that's why we have appeals processes-but if you argue with facts, you have a better
chance of getting your point across than if you argue with emotion. Our Director above is looking at Ace's hand to see if he had a logical alternative. On the Arnie/Barney thing he's probably looking at the Banks's hands to see which of their emotional arguments ("I'd have played a different card at trick one", "I'd have led differently at trick two", etc) are ignorable claptrap. Directors are trained to handle these situations-let them do so, and rest assured that you will be protected.

A major attraction of our game is that the rawest novice can play against the greatest expert-and win. There has never been an expert so perfect that a hand was never lost to lesser players who played well. True experts realize this. It's the expert wannabes who look around for foul play when they get a poor score against a lesser pair.

It has been an extremely stressful month of May for us at the Bridge Centre as we attempt to have our lease renewal signed. We were issued with an eviction notice for various technical violations of the lease agreement!

Happily, at the last hour, we were able to satisfy the landlord with all the technicalities, and we now have a lease agreement for a further five years! One of those technicalities means we can no longer have a smoking room because of city regulations. Smokers will therefore have to go outside and we ask that they be co-operative in keeping the entrance area clean and tidy, using the ashtrays provided, to keep everyone happy.

The reason we wanted to stay is that the site a good central location with reasonable parking. On a square foot basis the rental is very reasonable. We certainly weren't able to find anything comparable elsewhere in the city.

When Rachel and Melissa were diagnosed in the Spring of 1991, Steve and I were devastated when we were told that we were going to lose two of our three daughters. I cannot describe in words the pain and the suffering we experienced at that time. So unprepared were we for the years yet to come. For those of you who have parented, you will understand the natural instinct to nurture your children and help them when they are sick. It is an indescribable sense of helplessness when there is no cure for their sickness and you have to stand by and watch them get progressively weaker.

In the past years, Steve and I have done all we can to research their disorder in the hopes of slowing the progression. Having succumbed to the realization of not being able to help them, we have tried to give them all we possibly can. With the help of many charities and compassionate people, we have taken them to Disneyland and Disney World and they have received many gifts. Their days are spent having as much fun as their health will permit, and the highlight of every summer in a week at Camp Squamish.

When Government assisted programs end, it then becomes the family's responsibility to pay for nurses and attendants to help care for these children. It is extremely stressful caring for not one but two severely handicapped children on a 24 hour basis. As we have sadly read in the newspapers recently, some people just haven't been able to cope. It is one of the hardest responsibilities I have ever been faced with and one that never ends. It is so important for the parents to get respite away from these duties and makes thebreak easier for everyone if the children can have fun at the same time.

I want to thank you all for understanding our needs and being in support of our request. It is very difficult for Steve and I to publicly seek funding assistance, but we do it for Rachel and Melissa, and for the dedicated nurses and attendants who have been so loyal to our family over the years, and who on many occasions work for far less than they deserve.

Please pass along our sincerest thanks to all bridge players involved in your fund raising efforts.

MEYER got off to a fine start when Table 1 bid a wholly indefensible and, as it happens, completely unbeatable 64 on Board 1; many East's might bid 30 over

North's $1 \$$ opener with $\diamond$ KQxxxx and out, which would have made it quite impossible to get to slam; Table 2 made a slam try and properly stopped in 5S. 11 to City.

WEBSTER were set twice on \#3. 19-nil.
Valley missed game at Table 1 on \#4, while at Table 2 they showed the red card to an easy ten tricks. 31-zilch!

Valley again missed game, non-vulnerable this time, on \#5. 37 unanswered City IMPS!

On \#6 City were set at 4 4 , while their teammates at Table 2 made $3 \bigcirc$. City 40-Valley no score!

At Table 1, City N/S stopped in 24 (making three) on \#7, while Valley at Table 2 went on to make a very pushy 4. 40-10 City. \#9 saw Valley off two in an impossible 60 , while South at Table 1 was happy to make eleven tricks in NT. 51-10 City. On \#10 WEBSTER at Table 1 missed a 3NT game, making at Table 2. 61-10! \#11 was a one-trick set at both tables against Valley. 64-10! On \#13 South at both tables was in a misfitting 40; both failed but WEBSTER came two tricks closer. 64-17! On the final board before the tea-break, MEYER at Table 1 took the push to 30 and failed by one trick; their teammates at Table 2 took a rather different view of the hand, going down 4 at 3NT. 6 IMPS to Valley!

At the halfway point City was in a strong position with a 41 IMP lead. However, during the break the fifth member of the team, "Machine-Gun" Takishita, fresh from the airport and suffering from jet-lag, dropped into
the dressing-room to put the hex on by expressing his complete confidence (or else!). This may have had some effect as the second stanza unfolded...

SECOND HALF: A couple of small exchanges were followed by City at Table 2 missing a fine slam, while at Table 1 an overtrick in $6 \bigcirc$ had the Valley wondering how they might have reached the grand! 67-38 City.
\#5 had City's declarer at Table 1 struggle in 44 with 21 HCP against a bad split. He worried that Table 2 would stop below game for a plus, but of course Valley were too far behind to consider such a move and the defence was solid for down two. 70-38.
\#6 was an easy 4 for Valley, good for 11 tricks and making 12 at Table 1 when the defenders gambled; at Table 24 was shown the red card, making with an extra. I don't think the double of a freely bid contract at IMPs is a winning strategy (see \#4 in the first half, but then again see \#11 below! 77-38.
\#7 saw City's North at Table 1 go down four in a Moysian 24 (both vulnerable) with a combined 16 HCP; it was clear E/W were good for 48 . Would City bid it at the other table? They did! 83-38.

At the board exchange City had picked up another four IMPs for a 45 IMP edge (although we couldn't know it, of course). At Table 2 the City players felt that, apart from the missed slam at \#14, that things were still under control. At Table 1 City were less confident; Valley's East-West pair had got their act together and were hitting their stride. We started the second half with boards 8-14

on our table and Valley were singing a different tune than in the first stanza. With nothing to lose and, no doubt, some plain words at the break, they were now making a real battle of it. Had the VBC been able to stage a vugraph set-up, the audience-if they stayed-would have seen one of the most exciting comebacks in many years!
\#8: A push; the first since \#2 in the first half!
\#9: City at Table 1 went down three in 2 NT ; Valley made eight tricks at Table 2, for a swing of 7 IMPS. 83-45.
\#10: A weak $2 \Perp$ was reopened with 2 NT and passed out. Down one. At the other table, Valley tried for a swing but 3 NT went down three tricks. 5 IMPS to City. 88-45.
\#11: 2NT was set one trick by City at Table 1; at Table 2 a Kaplan-Sheinwold-MacKenzie-Precision bid which sometimes works didn't this time and the result was $2 \pm$ down four doubled for a 13 IMP swing! 88-58.
\#12: Nine tricks are available to E/W and both tables made them; but only Valley was in the NT strain. Seven more IMPS to Valley. 88-65.
\#13: A good 49 game was missed by City at Table 2! Ten more to Valley. 88-75 with one to go!
\#14: An interesting hand. North holds:

Partner opens 1 NT in second seat and RHO overcalls 24. I made the Texas Transfer bid of $4 \diamond$ and partner converted to 4 V . With the two spade losers I wanted to
make sure of a plus, so I passed, and LHO bid 4 4 , passed around to me. I thought of bidding $5 \$$ to see if it would excite partner, but still wanting a plus, I decided to simply bid 59 , which made. At Table 2 North-South bid without transfers to the non-vulnerable $6 \wp$-and made it. The swing: 11 IMPS to Valley.

## Final Score: City 88, Valley 86!

As the Iron Duke said after Waterloo, it was "a damned close-run thing." (He is also reported to have said he was far more afraid of his own troops than of the enemy, but I'm not at all sure that it is either proper, tactful or safe to invoke that quote here!) At IMPs one must always remember that the other table is going to have to play the same hands; boards \#4 and \#11 of the second half are simply the exception that proves the rule that your friends at the other table will play them as well as the enemy at yours. (If you can't depend on that, apply to join the enemy!)

That was a great IMP League season and the final was a strenuous cliffhanger. MEYER would like to pay tribute to all the teams they played throughout the regular season and the playoffs. Everyone greeted us with a friendly demeanour and ethical behaviour throughout; we hope we were able to match their standards.

Cosy Nostra are considering, in light of the strain of playing the entire " B " IMP League season, moving up to " A " next year for a rest!

## The NAOP Explained Qualifying is underway!

The North American Open Pairs (NAOP) Club Level Qualifying period has begun. The NAOP is a four-stage event which starts with masterpoint-rich club games, and leads up to the national finals at the Spring NABCs. There are three flights: Flight C is for non-Life Masters (to a maximum of 500 points), Flight B is for players under 1500 masterpoints, and Flight A is unlimited.

Stage One: Club Qualifying Games
The event begins at the club level. Club qualifying games are held during June, July, and August. They are usually open to all flights and stratified, although there are several games limited to the lower two flights and occasionally for Flight C only. All of these games have large overall awards for the winners, about three times the awards of a regular club game. The sanction fee is a little higher for NAOP games than for regular games, so expect to pay a bit more on qualifying nights for the chance at those extra masterpoints.

At least half of the pairs in each flight will qualify for the next stage. You qualify by being ahead of more pairs than you are behind (in any strat you are eligible for), or by scoring $50 \%$ or greater (anyone breaking average gets an automatic qualification to the Unit Final). If you get a "Q" for Flight A you are qualified for Flights B and/or C, if you are eligible. Similarly, a Flight B "Q" is a free pass to Flight C, if applicable.

If you don't qualify, just keep trying! You only need to qualify once to get to the next level.

## Stage Two: Unit Finals

The Unit Final will be held in September or October and will be a two-session game, with approximately half of the field in each flight qualifying for the next level. Depending upon attendance, Flights B and C may be combined and stratified. Having qualified at the Club Level, you may play with any other eligible player at the Unit Level.

## Stage Three: District Finals

The District Finals are scheduled for the Tacoma Sectional December 5-7. (Note: this information is from a very old and therefore extreme long-range schedule.) Depending on attendance, the event may be as long as four sessions in each flight. Any qualifying player may play with any other qualifying player in the District Final.

Stage Four: National Finals
The top two pairs in each flight of the District Finals receive a trip to the National Finals at the 1998 Spring NABCs in Reno.

Seems like a longshot, does it? Well, over the past ten years at least a dozen Unit 430 pairs have won trips to the nationals. In fact, the reigning champions in Flight A are Aidan Ballantyne and Gord McOrmond! This year could be your year. Don't miss out!
