PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - CHANGING TIMES

As we move into and beyond the summer, bridge players are going to notice a few changes at upcoming Unit 430 events. While our regular events throughout the year, such as the Monthly Unit Games and Mentor-Mentee Games will be largely unchanged, there will be some changes to our Sectional tournaments as discussed below. These changes will involve changes to starting times and playing sites, along with a few other minor changes, and are described more fully in the following paragraphs.

The Spring Sectional on the May 20-23 weekend at the Queensborough Community Centre will generally follow the customary format, featuring the Ben Lapidus Trophy Bracketed KO team event starting Friday evening, as well as two Canadian Bridge Federation Charity events on Friday afternoon, with the enhanced masterpoint rating which accompanies such games. A buffet luncheon featuring sandwiches and fruit will be served at the Swiss Teams event on Monday, May 23, and will be included in the entry fee for the event.

As we move on to the Evergreen Sectional to be held September 3-5 at the Engineers' Hall, we will be doing away with the Friday games at this site, because of the parking restrictions imposed by our hosts, that severely limit available parking spaces on Friday afternoon. So two-session events will be held on Saturday and Sunday along with the play through Swiss Teams event on Monday (Labour Day).

The Evergreen Sectional will also introduce new starting times for Saturday games, and for Sunday games if the Swiss Teams event is being played on the Monday of a long weekend. These games will now be played at 10:30 and 3:30 PM. A study of starting times at other Sectionals, both across Canada and in the western United States, has indicated a predominance of morning and afternoon games on weekend days, especially since the closing Swiss Teams events are always held commencing in the morning of the final day of the Sectional (in order to enable those players who have travelled some distance to get home at a reasonable time before their weekly activities begin on Monday).

The Roundup Sectional, to be played on November 4-6, will be played at a new tournament site, the Sunbury Hall in North Delta. Complete details regarding the address of this site will be available when the tournament flyer is published.

To celebrate the commencement of play at this new site and to recognize the longstanding support of ACBL members, your Unit Board has decided that the Friday evening game will be a special Membership Appreciation Game, where current paid-up ACBL members will have a special entry fee of \$2. Non-members and unpaid members will pay the nominal entry fee of \$10 per player, as well as the usual ACBL surcharge of \$3 per session.

Those are the main changes that are on the horizon. As for those events that do not represent change, the Unit will continue to sponsor the non-Life Master Future Stars Sectionals, with the next event occurring October 22-23. We also had a successful introduction last year of a one day 0-199 Sectional, and this year's event will take place on Saturday, September 24.

We also sponsor the Monthly Unit Games (MUGs) each month, typically on the first Saturday of each month, but players should check the Unit Website for exact dates, as the first Saturday occasionally conflicts with holidays or other major events in the Pacific Northwest. The MUGs are all pair games, except in February, June and October, when Swiss Teams events are held.

We also have the very popular Mentor-Mentee games, which have been well supported by our experienced players, and which our newer players pounce on when sign-up becomes available. The last two MM games have each had 34 tables in play, with several other Mentees being unable to play because we could not find any more Mentors.

Finally there is the District 19 Sectional Tournament at Clubs (STaC) which is coming up in early June.

All of the events described above do not just 'happen'. They involve a lot of preparatory work by the Unit Board members who have undertaken the responsibility of putting them on or assisting in a major capacity. These include:

- -our Sectional Coordinators Angela Fenton and Jim McKenzie, along with Partnership Coordinator Rhoda Tafler and our Catering Coordinator Corrine Tapley.
- -our Non-Life Master sectional coordinators Kathryn Shannon and Maryellen Gallo, who also manage the four Mentor-Mentee games;
- -our Supplies Coordinator, Gray McMullin and the amazing team which he has supporting him in the movement of our supplies to tournament sites;
- -STaC Coordinator James Harris;
- -and our Webmaster, Tom Anderson, who has set up a very useful and informative website, where you can find anything you need to know.

The other Unit Board Members, Vice President and Treasurer Fred Baldwin, and Matchpointer Editor John Teschke, also do a lot of work in their significant roles, while helping out where needed in all of the above-mentioned activities and events.

A big thank you to them all - Peter Morse, President, ACBL Unit 430.

SO ALL CAN PLAY- By Norma Doucette

For several years, the ACBL, the Unit, and most clubs have been asking players to avoid the use of scented products. It is noted on flyers for tournaments, on websites, and on special events flyers. It's wonderful that so many players understand and cooperate with this request.

For players with an environmental sensitivity, it is not merely unpleasant while they are at the table, it causes them health effects that can last for hours or days. Headaches and respiratory problems, allergic reactions, nausea, insomnia and a myriad of other conditions may ensue. These individuals can't control how their body reacts to the scent. But the person wearing the scent can solve the problem.

There is no one type of scent at fault. It can be subtle, expensive, organic or natural. It can be hand cream, cologne, aftershave, soap, shampoo, deodorant, etc. These products are available in unscented varieties. If you can find the word "unscented" on a product, usually "original" is close to scent free. To ensure all players enjoy themselves and suffer no ill after effects, please do not use scented products on days you will be playing bridge. If someone suggest to you that something you are wearing is causing them difficulties, please believe them. They have no reason to make this stuff up.

We no longer smoke at the table. Let's now try and eradicate scents during a game.

DISTRICT 4 SENIORS GAME SLOTS AVAILABLE

As you probably know, the BC Seniors games, now officially rechristened the 55 plus games, include both duplicate and social bridge. Winners get to enjoy the podium experience a la the Olympic games. Prominent local players have been winners in each of the three categories mentioned below in recent years. The game this year will be directed by prominent local player and director Brian Maksymetz.

It is scheduled for September 21-23, and will be held at Dogwood Centre in Coquitlam. This happens to be the week before the popular Seaside regional

tournament. The game lasts five sessions, and the cost is \$70 per player, \$140 per pair, that is \$50 for the entry fee plus \$20 for the required membership fee for the 55 plus organization.

There are three classifications which are each medalled separately and treated as parallel distinct games, though all entrants play against each other. The ACBL awards masterpoints as though it were a single flighted tournament in a way which may contrast with the medal award system. The three classifications are, 0-300 Masterpoints, 301-750 Masterpoints, and over 750 Masterpoints. If partners belong to differing masterpoint categories, the person with the highest number determines the class to which they belong. There is also a separate "Social" bridge game but only those with under 20 ACBL Masterpoints are allowed to participate. It is scored like the usual community centre money bridge contests.

The Unit 430 area is divided into two zones, zones 3 and zone 4. Zone 4 encompasses everything west of North Road and north of the Fraser River, with Richmond being part of zone 4. Burnaby and New Westminster all also part of that zone, but Surrey and Coquitlam however, are in zone 3. The North Shore and the area up at least as far as Whistler complete zone 4.

Because in recent years for whatever reason, interest in the contest has been limited for zone 4, we are signing up pairs on a first come first served basis for the nine places available. We will also sign up social bridge entries, of which there are six, for residents of this zone who qualify and wish to participate in that event. Social bridge entries have now been taken up. There remain two entries each for the 0-300, 300-750, and 750 plus duplicate slots in District 4.

For all events to play for zone 4, both partners must reside therein. There are also two places still available in zone 3, but only for those having more than 750 masterpoints. Prospective zone 3 entrants should send an email to alya@shaw.ca. to enquire. Zone 4 people interested in participating should apply to Marta Zahorecz, tel. 604-777-1157 or email at mzahorecz@telus.net.

We will be away during the last week in May for an Alaska cruise and will be in Penticton in June. Because the games are being held relatively late in the year, we have the month of June for people to determine whether they want to participate. The organization requires the entry fee to be paid up front for the entry to be accepted.

GIVE ME A HAND: SNAPSHOTS FROM RENO, NV

1. You hold **★KQJT86 ♥987542 ♦- ♣8.** Partner (that's me) opened 1 spade! Your bid? Partner's response was a reasonable 4 spades and we made 6. The full hand being:

★KQJT86 ♥987532 ♣8

★32 ♥AT64 ◆Q8542 ★62

∀KQ ♦KJ963 ♣Q97543

A9754 ♥J ◆AT7 AKJT

Query: how can you get there? After seeing all four hands you can! Partner bids 2NT - strong raise. You bid 3♥ (singleton or void) and now 5♦ (exclusion Blackwood) 5NT (two aces: the Ace of Diamonds does not count)- 6 spades. Easy game! Whether it is reasonable to have bid that way is another story.

2. This time I held ♣JT42 ♥Q976 ◆AJ7 ♣J6. The bidding was as follows: Left-Hand opponent opened 3♣ explained as an opening hand with 6 or more clubs. My partner bid 4♣ as a Michael's bid. RHO bid 5♣. My bid? If you bid 6♣ and your partner responds 6 hearts, LHO will double and the obvious spade lead beats you. This should have happened at one table, except that the spade lead was not that obvious to RHO, who led a club!

In the actual event, I passed the 5 club bid, not knowing how good my partner's

In the actual event, I passed the 5 club bid, not knowing how good my partner's hand was. LHO passed and partner bid 5 hearts. All passed and RHO led the King of Diamonds, and we made 7 for a near top since most pairs played in 6 hearts, down one after the Lightner double by west. The full deal:

AKQ75 AJT8532 ₹7

∀K4 **♦**T962 **♣**AKQ9542

♦9863 ♦KQ8543 ♣T83

♦JT42 ♥Q976 ♦AJ7 ♣J6

3. This time you hold (NV v. Vul) ♠752 ♥KT9 ◆T8 ♠QJT84. The auction is as follows: E 1♦ S(You) P; W 1♠ N(partner) P. E 4♥ (splinter bid) S P W. 4NT N (partner) 5♥! E: (whatever their response system was showing two key cards plus the Queen of Spades) S. P. W. 6♠ N(partner: pass; E. pass. S. you? I figured that six spades was cold for them and as long as we could take seven tricks our score (-1400) would be a better score than -1430. And so it turned out to be, the full hand being: ♠86 ♥AQ9853 ♦63 ♣653

♦KJT4 ♥J72 ♦AJ94 ♣K2

AQ93 ♥4 ♦KQ752 A97

♠752 ♥KT9 ♦T8 ♣QJT84

Since the field is strong, six spades should be fairly universal, but even if it is not, you still beat those who did bid six spades since -1400 is worth more matchpoints than -1430.

TOP OF THE STAC

Partner Andy Hellqvist and I had a magical game in the Canada-wide STaC on Thursday, February 18. There were 171 tables in play and we came in first overall with 67.92%, some 0.34% ahead of second place.

As we all know, Matchpoints can be a strange game. You need some luck as well as skill. Here are a couple of instances. Were we lucky or skillful?

1. You are playing against the best pair in the room, and you hold: ♠T93 ♦T9642 ♠AKQ53.

After a 2NT opening by right-hand opponent, they get to a 4♠ contract on a bidding misunderstanding - (one was playing Puppet Stayman, the other wasn't) instead of the normal 3NT.

You start with the Q, A, K of clubs, partner pitching the diamond Jack on the third round; the defense now crossruffs hearts and diamonds for down 6 instead of the more normal down 1.

2. This one is a mystery: (me) **AKJT3 76 AQ4 J62** (partner) **865 AKT985 K KQ4**.

We play in 4♠ making 6 for a top. The rest of the room is making 450 or 420. I guess that South chose to suppress his spade support to emphasize his 6 card heart suit.

3. This one is my favourite, because I can't really decide if it was just luck or whether to give my self credit for good judgement.

In second seat, Vul v. NV I pick up: ♠72 ♥AKQJ863 ♠T8 ♠T4. Right hand opponent opens 4♠ in front of me. My hearts are wonderful but my shape is not, and at these colours, sacrificing would be expensive if partner has nothing. I pass, left hand opponent passes, and partner backs in with 5♠. Right-hand opponent passes and leaves it up to me. Things look different now. If pard can bid at the five level, Vulnerable, he must have something. Maybe a club suit and stuff on the side. My hearts can play opposite a void, but may be useless to partner in a club contract if he can't get to my hand. After some thought, I bid 5♥ and all pass.

Dummy comes down with: ♠Q9 ♥2 ♦73 ♣AKQJ9732.

LHO cashes two top diamonds and switches to a club. RHO follows (whew!) so I win, draw trumps in four rounds and claim, making 5. The complete hand:

♥T975 **♦**AKQJ964 **♣**65

♦72 ♥AKQJ863 ♦T8 ♣T4

♦Q9 **♥**2 **♦**73 **♣**AKQJ9732

AKJT8653 ♥4 ♦52 ♣84

Played from my side, we can make 5 hearts or 5 clubs, because LHO is void in spades. From partner's side, the best we can do is make 3♣. As it happens, the opponents can make 5♠, but you can't really blame them for not getting there, especially on this auction.

4. We got another top for beating 2♥ doubled, one trick. At most tables they made 2♥ undoubled. Deep finesse says they should make only 1♥ but the correct defense is almost impossible to find. Declarer made one small mistake which allowed us to turn a possible bottom into a top.

5. As a last example, there is this: **★KQJ ♥A53 ◆AQT3 ♣875** (partner) **★A94 ♥K9764 ◆987 ♣J2**

We play in 3♥, making plus 140 for a top. The other pairs are either making plus 110, or they are -50. There is not much to the play. You are going to lose two clubs, and assuming the diamond honours are split (they are), one diamond, so you must hold your heart losers to one. If the hearts are 3-2 this is no problem. If South has four, with two honours you can't avoid two losers. The key then is to allow for a holding such as QTxx or QJxx with North. So you start with the heart Ace, and see the Jack fall from South. Applying restricted choice you play low to the 9 on the next round, and virtue is rewarded with South shows out. So why is this a top?

Matchpoints is a funny game. We didn't do anything brilliant, but we didn't make any mistakes either. As a result we were number 1 in Canada for that session.
