President's Message

Best wishes for 2017 to all Unit 430 ACBL members, our bridge club owners and other bridge players.

We have another busy year ahead in Unit 430 and I will outline below the major Unit activities that we anticipate running during the year, and some changes we are considering.

Unit 430 has a very active Unit Board made up of twelve hardworking individuals, and a number of other volunteers who contribute their help to various Unit events and activities. Thanks to all of you for your efforts on behalf of the membership.

During 2017, we will again be running four Open Sectional tournaments commencing with the Trophy Sectional on January 13-15. This tournament will be played at a new site, the St. Mary's Ukrainian Cultural Centre, which is located at 3150 Ash Street in central Vancouver, between Cambie and Oak Streets.

The Spring Sectional will take place on May 19 - 22 and the Evergreen Sectional on September 1 - 3, both at the Queensborough Community Centre, while the Roundup Sectional will be held November 10 - 12 at a site yet to be determined.

In addition to our Open sectionals, we also will have two Future Stars Sectionals for non-Life Masters, one on March 4-5 and the other in October. Both of these events will be held at the Engineers Hall, Burnaby. And a further one day 0-200 Sectional will be held at the Vancouver Bridge Centre on April 1 for players with less than 200 masterpoints.

One subject which the Unit Board considered at our most recent meeting was the cost of providing treats, hospitaliy and necessary staff at all of our tournaments. Because of the increasing cost, we have decided to restrict treats to a good supply of cookies, while coffee and tea will continue to be available (free if you bring your own cup) throughout.

Unit 430 also sponsors four Mentor-Mentee games each year. We will be running two of this year's games

in the Surrey/White Rock area, in recognition of the large number of developing players who reside there. We very much appreciate the participation of the Mentors (who play free, courtesy of Unit 430) in these games, as they help to raise the general level of and interest in, bridge in the Unit.

Also, as usual, we will be having a Monthly Unit Game (MUG) each month, usually on the first Saturday of the month, at the Vancouver Bridge Centre. There are some date exceptions because of nearby tournaments or holiday weekends, but there will be a MUG each month.

Two other tournaments which should draw a lot of local players are the week-long Regional Tournaments in Victoria and Penticton. The Victoria tournament will be held April 17-23 and has been moved back to downtown Victoria in the Conference Centre adjacent to the Empress Hotel, where it was successfully held for many years in the past.

The Penticton Regional will be held June 12 -18 at the spacious Penticton Convention Centre. This is one of the best attended Regionals in Canada, and with the June weather, many places to stay and ample dining options, it usually makes for an enjoyable week away from home, and a good opportunity to add to your masterpoint totals.

In closing, I would like to highlight our Unit website (at www.vancouverbridge.com). This website, maintained by Unit Board member Tom Anderson, contains a wealth of information concerning bridge locally and beyond. There are details (game times and locations) concerning the many club games available in the Unit area, and the game results in many of the clubs can also be accessed through the website.

But this is just a start, as local players are able to sign up for the Mentor-Mentee games on the website, access detailed information concerning nearby (and further away) tournaments, use the Partnership Desk for help in finding a partner for Unit events, and also search out information concerning Unit 430 administration. There is also an extensive history of the winners of our major Trophy events and year-long masterpoint races, extending back almost 50 years.

If you have any questions concerning any bridge re-

lated issue, please feel free to contact me or any other Unit Board member. The contact information for all of us may be found on the Unit Website under Unit 430 at the bottom of the Home Page.

Best wishes for a happy 2017, and may all your finesses and endplays be working this year.

Slamming at Seaside

You hold \bigstar K Q J 4 3 \heartsuit J 10 9 2 \diamondsuit Q \bigstar 9 4 3. Partner opens 2NT – so you bid 3 \bigstar (puppet), 3 \diamondsuit from partner, 3 \heartsuit (showing 4 hearts and 5 spades) and drive to slam when partner shows 4 spades.

You have 10 winners and need two heart ruffs in your hand. The simple answer is not to use the Ace of spades to pull trumps, as you have to use it to ruff the 4th heart. So win the $\diamond Q$ and play $\heartsuit A$ and a heart. A trump comes back: win the $\bigstar K$, ruff a heart low, now a low spade to the $\bigstar Q$, ruff the last heart with the \bigstar A, play the $\diamond AK$ throwing clubs and ruff a club low in dummy. Finally, draw the last trump with the $\bigstar J$. [*Editor's note:* playing the $\diamond AK$ before ruffing the last heart is better as it avoids some adverse distributions]. Next, you are sitting South at favourable vulnerability and hold:

How do you play to make?

The key, of course, is the spade suit – so you do not touch it until the end. Win the $\diamond A$, then $\heartsuit A$, $\clubsuit K$, trump to the $\heartsuit K$, cash the $\clubsuit A$ throwing a diamond, ruff a club, heart to the $\heartsuit Q$, ruff a diamond, leaving:

Now you lead the $\bigstar 2$, covering west's low card with the $\bigstar 9$. East will win the \bigstar as cheaply as possible (\bigstar J) but is end-played. A spade return gives you a guaranteed finesse, while either side suit gives you a spade pitch from your hand and a ruff in dummy.

Now for more confessions. In a recent team game at the club, one of my frequent partners and I had a few auctions that didn't end in the right places and then a few poor results. Can you do better? Here are the hands and problems: Hand 1: All Vul ♠ Q J 7 Partner You ♡ 4 3 1♡ P 1NT 2♣ ♦ K 10 9 8 5 4 2 3♡ P ? ♣ 5

You have a minimum, should you raise or pass?

Do you bid the full value of your hand or do you bid less? One theory says that partner should have a full opening bid (unless they have the classic 4-1-4-4 shape, in which case maybe they have just 11 or 12). 3 would be encouraging (you play Lebensohl) but partner won't play you for 11 and usually won't have a heart stopper to allow him to bid game. It's not too clear but you don't want to miss game opposite a full 14, 15 count or more. Your heart stopper allows you to hold up in hearts as long as necessary. So you bid 3NT. Partner tables his hand and gives you the usual "Good luck partner". (Is that really a takeout double?)

You win pitching a spade from dummy, and if you can bring in the diamond suit, you will have a chance for 9 tricks.

Your partner, with \bigstar K2 \heartsuit A K Q 10 8 6 2 \diamondsuit A 6 \clubsuit Q 9, perhaps should have bid $4\heartsuit$ all by himself, taking pressure off you.

A better bid with this hand would be to ignore the singleton club and just bid 2NT, or on the theory that partner will have a smattering of high cards, 3NT. You decide that your queens and jacks are bad cards to do more than bid just $2 \clubsuit$. After Pass by LHO, partner is looking at: \bigstar 3 \heartsuit A J 7 2 \diamondsuit A 7 5 \bigstar J 9 7 3 2 and reasonably decides that he's shown his hand and also passes. 2 making 6 legitimately, making 7 on careless defense (why **should** they care?) More Ugh!

- Hand 2: Lose 6. The opponents bid 3NT making 6.
- Hand 3: Push. Teammates didn't make game either.

Hand 4: Win 1. Teammates bid 4 and made $5\heartsuit$.

- Hand 5: Lose 6. Opponents made the routine $4 \bigstar + 2$
- Hand 6: Win 11. Opponents just made $3\diamondsuit$.

Result: Dead tie.

Your scores should be better.

Do As I Say

You will recall in a previous Matchpointer, in my 'Arguing with Eddie Kantar' article, I stressed that the purpose of signalling is to guide the defense, not to show the location of high cards.

With that as a clue, can you spot the correct defense?


Your opening lead is the $\diamond 9$. It goes deuce, Queen, Ace.

Declarer now plays the \bigstar 6, you play the 4, dummy plays the 2, and partner wins the 7!

Partner now cashes the \diamond King (declarer playing the 3) and you encourage in clubs.

Partner dutifully shifts to the \clubsuit Jack. You win the Ace, and lead the \heartsuit 8 for partner to ruff. Partner now exits with a spade, and declarer escapes for down 1. What went wrong?

Here is the full deal: Matchpoints, Both Vul, South deals [see top of next column]



On the auction partner, was certain the spades were 4-4-4-1 around the table and could not believe that you had a trump left to ruff a diamond with. Still the fault is yours, for encouraging in clubs when partner cashed her diamond King. You are in no hurry for a club shift, and want partner to continue diamonds. You suspect partner is void in hearts, else she would have led her (presumed) stiff rather than cashing the diamond King, so the way to get her to play diamonds is to DISCOURAGE clubs. Partner with nothing better to do will play a diamond and will be astonished when you ruff, give her a heart ruff with the DEUCE, get in again with the \clubsuit A, and give her another heart ruff for down 3.

Too bad I didn't follow my own advice about signalling to guide the defence rather than show high cards, isn't it?

Play These Slams

by Nick Stock In the last Matchpointer I asked this question:

How should you play 6NT on a spade lead?

And here is another slam to play - this one 100%:

In a friendly team game (ok, not too friendly as you do play for some money) you pick up, Vul vs Non vul: **♠** A 5 2 ♥ K Q 6 ♦ A K J 4 **♣** Q 7 6 As you are dealer, you open the bidding with $1\diamond$. LHO interferes with 2 Michaels and your partner doubles and RHO passes. Since you have no agreement about this double, you assume diamond length with a few values. Accordingly you bid 3NT expecting to end the auction. Your partner, who you know is unafraid to bid the full value of her hand, surprises you by bidding a prompt $6 \diamondsuit$. You await dummy a little anxiously as LHO selects the \heartsuit J for opening lead:

Teams, Vul vs Non vul ◆ O J 3 ♡A 5 Lead: ♡J ♦ Q 9 8 7 3 2 ♣K4 ♠ A 5 2 ♡KQ6 \diamond A K J 4 **♣**076

This is 100% (sort of). Plan the play.

Answers:

You have 10 tricks on top and therefore need two more tricks from one of the minor suits. One way to get those extra tricks is to have the suit break 3-3. An additional chance can come from finessing against the \clubsuit Q. To do that you need to lead from dummy towards the Jack. You will succeed whenever the club suit breaks 3-3, whenever the club suit breaks 4-2 with the Queen in RHO's hand and very occasionally (on a minor suit squeeze) when the club suit breaks 5-1 with the Queen in RHO's hand. This makes the play in clubs slightly bigger than 60%.

If you play on diamonds, you will succeed whenever diamonds are 3-3 or when diamonds are 4-2 with a doubleton QJ, Q10 or J10 (3 out of 15 combinations). This makes the play in diamonds slightly under 46%.

Clearly, playing on clubs is best.

This hand really is 100% if you can guess which opponent has a particular card. The card to guess is the ♣A.

After drawing trumps you will lead a club past the A

scoring a club trick. You'll then return to hand to play the \heartsuit K Q to pitch a club from dummy. Dummy will be good except for a losing spade. If the opponent with the

A rises (so you have played neither King nor Queen), you will have two pitches from dummy, one on the \heartsuit K Q, one on othe \clubsuit K Q. To guess who has the \clubsuit A, just imagine if LHO would bid 2 \diamondsuit Michaels with just the \clubsuit K and \heartsuit J. Not likely, but barely possible. So place the \clubsuit A with LHO. The play:

Win the \heartsuit A in dummy. Draw 3 rounds of trumps ending in hand (trumps are 3-0, LHO has 0). Lead a club towards the King in dummy. LHO ducks. Win the club King. Now \heartsuit 5 to the King. \heartsuit Q, pitching a club from dummy. Dummy has only a spade loser. [At the point you lead a club towards the dummy, LHO is in the grips of what is called a Morton Fork Coup - rising with the ace and ducking lead to the same end result but by different forks in the road.]

In Memoriam

This past year we lost quite a few regular bridge players and some have already been commemorated at local clubs. Gray McMullin reflects on someone who others may not have known very well:

RICK GORMAN

Back in September, we had a spate of bridge players dying off. These included Greg Lamb, Chester, Toyo, Charlotte, and a couple of others. Unbeknownst to us, my friend and Friday afternoon partner, Rick Gorman, had died in mid-August.

When I played with him on a Friday, he seemed fine, but when trying to confirm for the next week, he never got back to me. And he was absent on BBO.

I feared the worst even then. His phone was set up on my account, and in checking it, there were zero calls after mid-August. We finally had confirmation from his building manager, late November, that the manager had found him passed away when he entered Rick's suite to check on him, as he had failed to show up to pay his rent.

Rick and I went back 40 years, but we'd lost touch until he showed up back in my life three years ago when $\frac{8}{8}$ he came to the "bridge lessons" that I was offering at the downtown community center. He became my #2, taking over in my absence, and helping with the other players.

Through hard living, Rick had damaged his hearing. This made communicating with him most difficult. He constantly missed alerts, and had a hard time understanding explanations. And of course, coming to partnership understandings was most painful. Other bridge players would recognize Rick as the guy that I yelled at a lot. We would have loud exchanges, both at and away from the table.

Let me tell you a side of Rick that you may not have known. He was a good friend, that helped me immensely with every endeavour. I have been the Supplies Manager for the Unit Board for many years. The most tedious and boring part of my job, is to travel to the club, where the Unit Board supplies are located, and organize and re-organize materials (this has to be done after every tournament), order new stuff, refurbish bidding boxes and duplicate boards..... the list goes on. Rick donated a lot of his hours helping me out. His most important job was simply showing up. I am a great procrastinator: I will find any excuse to put off this boring work. But with Rick committed to showing up, I HAD to show up too. And of course, once we were there, the work went faster and was more fun with more people involved.

Rick's help also extended to my personal life. He helped me re-plant plants, do spring cleaning, etc., but when I tried to pay him for his work, he would refuse payment. He was not rich, but the most he would ever allow me to do for him, was to buy him breakfast, or lunch. He wouldn't even let me pay for his bridge.

This was my friend Rick. One Friday afternoon, we are arguing with each other, playing bridge, and the next week nothing.

Next time you play, be nice to one another. Be nice to your partner, be nice to you opponents. And really look at your partner, really look at your opponents. Look at them, as if its the last time you will ever see them. Because, who knows, it may be.

I miss my friend, Rick Gorman. Gray McMullin

Use the On-line Partnership Desk

Need a partner for any tournament events? Have you checked out the on-line Partnership Desk at the Unit 430 home page? If you aren't already using this, please take a look. It's the best way of getting in touch with others who are looking for a game, and finding a good partner.

Go to the home page (<u>www.vancouverbridge.com</u>). Near the top there will be a listing for upcoming tournaments. The Partnership Desk is opened up usually about 30 days before the event takes place.

When you click on the link, it will open up a new page. At the top you can click on the flyer to figure out what events you want to play. Then click on "Add my name to the partnership desk." You will be asked for your name and a password (the password is so you can revise your listing).

Then add a note listing the events you want to play, contact information (people usually include either or both an e-mail address and telephone number), and something about yourself (masterpoints and preferred system are often listed) and maybe the kind of partner you're looking for (someone patient with newbies, maybe, or who likes to experiment with new gadgets or who likes pina coladas--okay maybe not that last bit). There's lots of space that you can use.

This is important: once you find a partner, then please go back and revise your listing (you'll need to remember your password to do this--if you've forgotten your password, then use the contact info on the website to get the webmaster to make the changes). If you've found a partner for all of the games you wanted to play, delete the listing. Otherwise, revise it to target any events where you are still looking.

If you haven't done so yet, please give the Partnership Desk a try. Feedback is always welcome. We want these resources to work as well as they can for our members!

How did that happen?

Marge Neate told me this story about an unusual result she had at a recent pairs game. On the third board of the round they had the slightly unusual auction (well unusual for us inveterate bidders):

Pass Pass Pass Pass

Shortly thereafter they called the director and he ruled that both pairs would get an average minus on the board. Both pairs were chagrined.

How and why did that happen?

As Marge explained, the players had been having a lively discussion after the second board. After pulling out their cards for the third board, Marge was in first seat without an opening bid and so passed. Her LHO also didn't have an opening bid. Her partner, **looking at the cards from the second board**, passed. And, finally, her RHO, **also looking at the cards from the second board**, made the final pass.

After they entered the score, they realized what they had done and got the ruling from the Director.

Did you ever pull out cards from the wrong board? [I have but never had a full auction.] How about bidding AND PLAYING AND CLAIM-ING as declarer on a hand with 12 cards in dummy, 14 in hand? [The director was bemused by everybody's ability to recognize dummy's shape!]
