

Bridge in Munich by James Harris


When my wife and I travel, I like to play at local bridge clubs if I can. So when we were in Munich, Germany to visit our son and his family over Christmas, I took the opportunity to play at a local bridge club. The Bridge Club München-Lehel (http://www.bridge-im-lehel.de/)

located in central Munich is very friendly and its website encourages visitors to play there. So I contacted the partnership desk person and she arranged for me to play with an English speaking member.

I played three times at the Club and I enjoyed it very much. The standard bidding system in Germany is called "Forum D" and it is similar to Standard American (that is, opening 5 card majors, 15-17 no trump, etc.), so it was not too difficult to bid.


There were two hands I played that caused some amusement.

Here is the first one:



Sitting second, West opened 4 Hearts. This is a sound bid and a contract that will make with normal play. However, when the bidding came round to East, she bid 6 Hearts! She did this having no hearts! Declarer got very flustered trying to play this impossible contract and ended up going down 4!

Here is the second:



This was the very next hand, which saw two passes to East, who then bid 4 Spades! With 22 high card points and only a 6 card suit, most players would open a strong 2 clubs (2 diamonds would be the equivalent bid in Germany) and await developments. With West holding 10 high card points, the cold slam would likely be reached and some players would reach the cold grand as well. In any event, the bid came round to West and I said jokingly: "Aren't you going to bid 6 Spades now?!". West passed of course. As we played the hand it became clear that East was going to take ALL of the tricks, so we all had a good laugh: with the same opening bid in one hand an unmakeable slam is bid and in the other a cold grand slam is missed! It is surprising how often bad bidding can lead to a good story.

Bid This Slam?

Playing in a friendly game against good opponents you pick up:

- ★ K 9 6 5
- **9** 8
- ★ K 10 5 4 3
- ♣A 10 7

You are in first seat and although your hand could be opened (10 high in an Ace and two kings plus a singleton) you are playing with a partner who is not known to be a shy bidder. So you pass.

Your LHO also passes and partner opens the bidding I. RHO also passes. You have quite a few possible bids, including a 3♥ splinter (if that is not some invitational bid with hearts - passed hand fit jump, or invitational in hearts with a six card+ suit), 2NT (if that shows a near game forcing 4 card raise and is not some other understanding for a passed hand), or finally, some kind of Drury. In my case I play 2 way Drury with 2♣ being a 4 card raise, 7-11, 2♦ being a 3 card limit raise. Over 2♣ partner can bid 2♠ to find out my range and other information. That is how our auction went and now the full value of my hand was expressed by a jump to 3 showing the singleton. Partner marked time by inviting a cue bid with a simple 3 bid. When I cooperated with a 4 cue, he was able to keycard and bid the slam.

This was the whole hand for playing:

- ★ K 9 6 5
- **9** 8
- K 10 5 4 3
- ♣A 10 7
- ♠ A Q J 10 4
- ♥Q10953
- A
- ♣ K 9

RHO was on lead and tried a high heart (Ace) followed by a low club. When the K came down with two ruffs in dummy, the slam came rolling home. Would you and should you bid this slam playing your methods?

Bridge Distraction


When you are betting thoroughbreds and need something to do while waiting for the next race, 20 minutes for 4 boards works perfectly, time-wise.

Today, something happened that was so bizarre that my brain flashed to the old bromide that an infinite number of monkeys pounding on an infinite number of keyboard keys would eventually produce all the works of Shakespeare. [Ed. note: Actually, just one monkey on one keyboard is enough, eventually].

Of course, this wasn't in that category but it was weird enough that it needed to be shared. I was West and started the auction with a pass. North and East did likewise and South opened INT. Now when you are playing in these 4 board matches you want to check what skill level your opponents and your partner profess to be. North is Advanced, East is a Robot and South is an Expert. Of course all this self-identification is full of liars so you only pay attention when someone identifies themselves as Beginner or World Class. Usually the Beginners are pretty truthful so you underbid when they are playing the hand so they can get some success in making a contract. I've tracked down one World Class identified player from Australia and she was definitely World Class having represented Australia in world competitions. The Experts are a hodgepodge of reality and fantasy.

Enough said, South opened INT and, not vulnerable, I bid 2♣ for the majors. It was 4 minutes till race time. But BBO robots play Cappelletti over I NT so 2♣ should be a single suit. North passed and East bid 2 asking what my single suiter was. I bid 2 since I screwed up and will play the hand quickly. All passed and LHO lead the \$5.


Hand rotated to make me South:

The "Quadfecta" bridge distraction.


Defend These Hands

Playing matchpoints the two hands below have a similar theme. For an experienced defender, the first is quite a bit easier. For the second, a good defender will know what to play and why.


Hand I

You are West in fourth seat, everybody vulnerable, with an 11 count that you might not open after three passes, even though you have both majors.



But our opponents have this auction:

You start with a normal fourth best heart, \$\square\$6. Partner wins the ♥A and returns the ♥I. Declarer covers so you win and return the ♥7. Partner overtakes with the \$\infty9\$ and leads his last heart to your **V8.** Declarer pitches clubs from dummy on the third and fourth round and throws a club from hand on the fourth heart. You guess to lead a spade and declarer plays the 10 while your partner contributes the I and declarer wins the . Phew! Declarer now plays A from hand and another diamond as partner follows with the ●9 and ●Q. You lead your ●6 to establish your spades. Counting, you see that declarer has three more diamond tricks to come and must have the AQ left, to bring their original point count up to 15. So they will have a total of 4 diamonds, I club, and 2 spades to make one notrump. But you are playing matchpoints and declarer may be tempted to take the club finesse. What should you pitch on the three diamond tricks?



If you throw a club and both your spade winners, declarer can take the club finesse but you will have to give them a club at the end. Instead, you should consider throwing two clubs (coming down to a singleton King) and keep a spade to cash. That will give you the opportunity to get +100 if declarer takes the finesse (as long as your partner doesn't throw all their clubs). It will also allow declarer to make 2 if they don't take the finesses. You have to gauge declarer's character.


Hand 2

Playing in the same matchpoint event, you pickup your usual 5 count.

Your partner deals and passes as RHO opens the bidding with $2 - \frac{1}{2}$.

The opponents give inconsistent explanations for the auction, North saying their 5♣ bid was a slam try in spades while South said they weren't sure about spades so bid the notrump slam instead over 6♥. Not wishing to give anything away, you lead from your longest major, the ♥7.



As dummy comes down you hold your breath, hoping that you haven't pickled partner's VQ. All is well though as declarer wins the WQ in hand, then the W A and then leads a heart to the dummy. Declarer pitches a club on the fourth heart as do you and starts on spades by leading to their 🗐 in hand. By now you have a partial count on declarer's hand. They've promised a 22 count you have 5, dummy 12, so partner has at most a Jack. If declarer has AQI they are just going to take a diamond finesse and claim 12 tricks after it loses. But the pitch of a club by declarer could mean that they started with 4 clubs and have AQ and K|x left. Accordingly, when declarer cashes the **&**K in hand and continues with the **Q** you pitch another club. Declarer overtakes in dummy and leads the 10. Your partner throws another diamond on this and you are down to:

K 9◆ O 10 8 7

If you are contemplating throwing a diamond, in anticipation of declarer taking a diamond finesse and then a club finesse, you should realize that after a diamond finesse into your now singleton king, you will be forced to lead a club away from your ♣Q. Declarer will let that ride around to their ♣, cross to dummy with the A then cross back to their hand with the ♦A to get to trick 12, the ♣K. [Not only that, if declarer is not noticing your pitches but plays on clubs taking a club finesse, they'll be forced to fell your singleton King.] So it must be better to throw a third club and hope that declarer now takes one of the two finesses. If declarer plays on clubs, expecting them to break (AA, another A) the jig will be up as your partner will show out on the second round and declarer can play ♣K from hand and the ♣ to endplay you into leading away from your •K.

On this hand, your only hope is not to come down to a singleton King but that declarer will play for one of the finesses to work (75%) and will try diamonds first. When you win your • K you'll just return a diamond and beat 6NT.

This is the opposite of hand I.

Vancouver Regional

As many of you are by now aware, the Vancouver regional which was planned and fully booked to occur at the Croatian Cultural Centre on April 8-14 was abruptly cancelled by the Croatian Cultural Centre, even though the District 19 board had fully paid its deposit (half of the total). The CCC cancelled all other hall rentals for 2024 because of restrictions stemming from their tax status. So the GVBC was also displaced as were other recurring events, e.g. bingo night.

The District 19 board was able to get a refund for the deposit but was not able to recover other sunk costs. Additionally, by the time the booking was cancelled, it was too late to find another venue in Vancouver. Indeed, reasonably priced venues for a regional in Vancouver are extremely difficult to find. The District 19 board is currently looking for a possible venue in Vancouver for 2026.
